SUICIDE IS SHIPPED WEST

ENTERPRISE SUICIDE DISTRESSING IN EXTREME.

Widow Met Here Last Night by Brother and His Wife.

Last evening the remains of the late S. E. Carnahan who committed suicide at Enterprise, was met in La Grande by a brother L. W. Carnahan of Boise, in company with the brother

and his wife, and the widow of the unfortunate man, the corps was sent to Portland for burial. Speaking of the incidents leading up to the suicide, the Enterprise Record-Chief says: Seldon E. Carnahan, who came to Enterprise on Monday to take the position of bookkeeper with the E. M. & M. Co., died suddenly yesterday noon after taking a powerful poison. A card was found in his pocket on which, in Mr. Carnahan's handwriting were these words: "Am a nervous wreck and going insane, so have poisoned myself. "Notify Mr. Hyatt at Enterprise M. & M."

No other explanation of the man's act has been forthcoming. He had been in poor health, his wife said, but there was no intimation of a con-

dition serious or threatening enough to prompt suicide.

Before going to Portland to attend the state merchants' association last week Mr. Hyatt had been in correspondence with Mr. Carnahan, who was an applicant for the position L. E. Jordan expects to vacate shortly. Mr. Carnahan's references and endorsements were of the highest character and Mr. Hyatt looked him up in Portland and engaged him. The two came to Enterprise together.

The new bookkeeper was introduced to the E. M. & M. force and Mr. Jordan showed him the duties of the position. Yesterday morning Mr. Carnahan went to both drug stores asking for poison to kill a sick dog. One clerk advised him to shoot the dog, but the bookkeeper later bought a deadly poison, signing the name E. L. Wilson on the register kept by law for the purpose. He said he wanted something that would put the dog out of the way quickly and with as little pain as possible.

A short time later S. O. Norris saw the man leaning against a post in the E. M. & M. lumber yard, and ran to tell G. M. Gally. The latter ran to the yard and arrived there just as Mr. Carnahan collapsed and expired.

The body was taken to the undertaking rooms of the Enterprise House Furnishing company and Mr. Hyatt was notified. He informed Mrs. Carnahan, who had come with her husband and was stopping at the Enterprise hotel. Telegrams were sent to Mr. Carnahan's brother at Boise and to his wife's parents in Portland. Relatives are expected on today's train.

Mr. Carnahan was 27 years old and had lived in Portland for years. He seemed a quiet refined man.

St. Paul Canal Not Favored.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Although the war department's engineer corps has disapproved officially of the project to have a canal from the Mississippi at St. Paul to Lake Superior, they have decided that the citizens of that section shall have a chance to be heard on the proposal.

The special board report shows that a careful examination of the project does warrant the government in making the required outlay, according to an official statement today.

Such a project would be as great, or greater than the Erie canal project originally was. The cost would mount into millions, and the engineers could not find that this amount would be expended profitably.

Ex-Chief Now Farmer

Baker, Feb. 24.—Farming will be the vocation of William Reilly, according to a statement given out by the ex-chief of police of this city today. Mr. Reilly will leave for Gooding, Idaho, about March 1, and will immediately start spring plowing on a 160 acre tract of irrigated land in that vicinity which he purchased last July. His family may remain here for a week or 10 days after that time, when they will join him in Idaho.

Mr. Reilly resigned from his position as chief of the Baker police January 1. He mentioned that the cause of his resignation was that he wanted to be free to move onto his holdings in Idaho.
