Sarah Bernhardt, who had her right leg amputated February 23 rather than submit to five months of idleness while the doctors were treating it is 54 years of age. Artists have pronounced Bernhardt's limbs perfect in their proportion.

Both Paris and Brussels claim her as a daughter. Her real name is Rosine Bernard, and Sarah Bernhardt was assumed when she made her stage debut in Paris in 1862. Her first American tour was made in 1880 and her last one in 1913. She has one son, Maurice, a playwright, and a great granddaughter. She appeared in "L'Aiglon," the role in which she is pictured here, in America in 1900.
