Friday Evening.

BOYS CUT MANY CAPERS

CURIOSITY LEADS TO ARREST
OF FOUR BOYS.

Window-smashing, False Alarm and
Suspicious Horse Deal Seen.

Horsestealing, window-smashing and turning in false fire alarms all came within the scope of a jamboree indulged in by four North La Grande boys Saturday night, if confessions since heard, and detached stories of the spree given to the police, are correct. The stolen horse has been returned but there still remain the window-smashing campaign which is charged up to four youngsters all under 13, and the false alarm business which took the department to T and North Fir early Sunday morning.

The boys are Frank Vincore, son of Edgar R. Vincore, Harold and Eugene Long, sons of Addison Long, and Arnold Gerber, stepson of Valentine Cramer.

Curiosity led to the arrest. The Vincore boy had been to the police station earlier in the evening to turn over a horse which he says he found running loose on "Y avenue in Old Town." It is said by the police that he really led the D. McDonald horse from a hitching rack with the intention of riding it to Pendleton where he was to embark on life's journey for himself. This much is speculation for the boy says he found the horse astray. Anyway the police affirm that he tried to make his getaway but on reaching the Oro Dell bridge became confused and returned to the city. Voluntarily taking the horse to headquarters and there abandoned his journey over the mountains. It was his second visit to the police station at night that led to his arrest.

So far as known there is no proof the boy stole the animal.

The story of the escapades reads like a dime novel.

Obtaining some Sommer hotel stationery, Vincore wrote an affectionate farewell letter to his sister, saying he was going out into the world to make his mark. That was earlier in the evening and the letter was left on the front porch of the Vincore home where the parents found it Sunday. But the horse episode didn't end it. Later on the Vincore youth and the two Long boys and Arnold Gerber celebrated a glass-breaking campaign on North Fir street, it has been learned. The Harris store, the Grider shop, the house occupied by Asa Roberts and the Engineer Schubert home, all suffered. About that time, the Gerber boy took his departure, going to his trundle bed. But the night was still young for the other three.

Vincore told the police that about midnight they hid in a ditch while Julius Fisher passed them on his way home, and that when he had gone in they hurried to the call and sent in the alarm. Mr. Fisher says he saw nothing of the boys but had been

Colorado Railroad Rates Probed
Denver, March 1.—The Colorado Public Utilities Commission today opened an investigation in the passenger rates of all railroads operating in the State. Representatives of 28 different roads appeared in answer to subpoenas issued by the Commission.

The decision to make the investigation, which is expected to result in many substantial rate reductions, followed the receipt of complaints from various parts of the State. There is absolutely no conformity in rates, the Commission declares. Fares vary from three cents a mile to as high as 11 cents a mile on some of the mountain roads.

A state-wide investigation into the rates charged for carrying coal by the railroads is planned by the Commission to start March 15.

The principal roads affected by the investigation starting today are: The Santa Fe, Burlington, Colorado & Southern, Rock Island, Colorado-Midland, Denver & Rio Grande, Denver-Salt Lake, Great Western, Missouri Pacific and Union Pacific as well as 18 subsidiary branch and local lines.

Hospital Money Available.

Pendleton, Feb. 24.—Governor Withycombe having yesterday signed the appropriation bill for the Eastern Oregon State Hospital the money for the additional wing and other improvements is now available and it is expected to have actual construction work underway within 90 days.

"We have matters moving to an extent already," said Superintendent McNary when questioned today regarding the new work, "I am expecting to go to Salem about the first of the month to go over the plans with the architect. I presume Mr. Knighton will have the work and that the original plans for enlarging the institution will be carried out. However, I have a few changes to suggest and some new architectural work will have to be done.

It is my opinion that within a short time the board will advertise for bids upon the work. The advertisement will have to run for 60 days and the contract will then be let. Actual work should be underway inside of 90 days.

One reason why work on the new wing will be taken up at once is the fact it is intended to send a large number of patients here from Salem
