Handcuffed Man Causes Stir.

Walla Walla, March 2.—When Sabina Nadota, or Robeno Battiste, the "handcuffed" prisoner at the county jail, started out for a walk Saturday afternoon, he did not imagine his action would arouse the officials of county and nation. But that is just what happened, and before Nadota had been gone half an hour Deputy Sheriff Sam Bryan and Immigration Inspector Wells were hot on the train in a Ford car. They heard the man had been seen north of town, and wended their way thither, though without catching a glimpse of the man, who once before had made his getaway and had given the sheriff's crew some real work to retake him.

It was while Bryan and Wells were hiking about the suburbs that Nadota was seen leisurely walking about Main street, and Constable George Thompson escorted him to the county jail, where he looked wonderment and surprise on learning that his absence had caused alarm. Nadota merely had gone for a stroll, and, after being allowed the liberty of the court yard, felt there would be no harm in extending the scope of his wanderings. But he was on his way back when the constable located him.

Nadota's hands are improving rapidly and it is expected he will be ready for release within a short time. He appears wholly at home in the county jail and tells callers that he has no desire to leave.

But hereafter he will be required to inform jail officials when he wants to take an extensive stroll.

Municipal Plant Troubles.

SEEK SWEDISH HEIRS

Bourne Man's Estate Goes to Relatives Across Atlantic.

Baker, March 3.—The task of locating the relatives of Gus Anderson, in Sweden, who died last night at the hospital in this city of pneumonia, is craved by A. H. Brown, who filed this morning his application for the position as administrator of the estate of the deceased. According to Brown's petition, Anderson was a native of Sweden, having been born in Borose, in which vicinity most of his heirs reside. It will be necessary to get in touch with Mr. Anderson's relatives before a settlement of the property can be made.

The estate is estimated at approximately \$6500, one-half of which is in Portland.

The funeral will be held in this city tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Welch undertaking parlors. Members of the Bourne lodge of Eagles, of which Mr. Anderson was a member, will attend the ceremony.

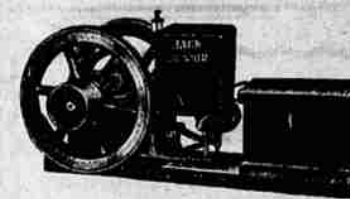
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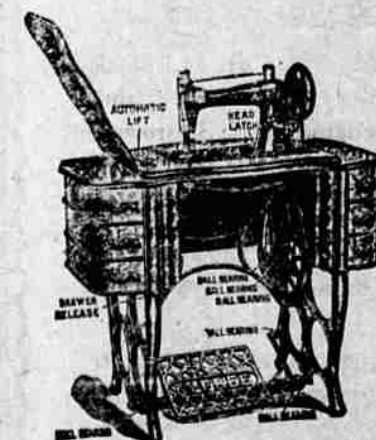
