Important Case Decided.

Baker, March 2.—Circuit Judge Anderson yesterday handed down a ruling in the case of the Liverpool and London and Globe Insurance company vs. the Eastern Oregon cash grocery. First National bank of Sumpter and the sheriff of Baker county. The ruling was on a demurrer of the defendants to the complaint. The demurrer was overruled on three points alleged, and sustained on one point.

Judge Anderson overruled on the claim that the court has no jurisdiction; that several causes of suit were improperly united; that the complaint did not state facts sufficient to constitute cause of action. The court sustained the contention of the defendants that in the parties named defendants to the action J. W. Ball was not made a defendant, as he should have been.

The present suit grew out of an action of the E. O. cash grocery against J. W. Ball and was to prevent attachment of the latter's bank account on the ground that it was not his own personal account, but that the money belonged to the plaintiffs in the action, whom Ball represented in Sumpter. The sheriff was made a defendant and enjoined from attaching the account and the papers were served on the official by Coroner West, according to law when the sheriff is made a defendant in any legal action.

In his ruling the judge gives the plaintiff five days to file an amended complaint in the suit.

Take Fling at Experts.

Baker, March 3.—The report of the accountants, Charles H. Whitney and Davis Miles, on their examination of the county books was filed yesterday. The report is complimentary to all the offices in the county except one. The experts report that the books of the county clerk are in excellent shape, as are the books in the offices of the sheriff, assessor and all others except the treasurer. They state in their report that the treasurer's books were very badly kept last year but found a shortage of only \$8.80 as the result of errors. They take a fling at the state auditors who went over the books as representatives of the state insurance commissioner. They say "the apparent shortage mentioned in the state accountant's report is apparently an apparition, and exists only in the minds of the accountants."

The report shows that the amount of warrants drawn from the general fund the last three years for the running expenses of the county reach \$300,807.03, divided as follows: 1912, \$95,533.55; 1913, \$99,924.41; 1914, \$112,349.67. The road warrants drawn the past three years total \$114,462.39, as follows: 1912, \$37,187.38; 1913, \$37,845.82; 1914, \$39,429.19.
