EGGS DROP TO 20 CENTS

EVEN AT THAT FIGURE, GROCERS HAVE MANY.

Flour Reported to Be Due for Slump in Portland.

Eggs went down this morning, and still the quantity keeps up. Egg diets have been prescribed in many households, because it is about as cheap a food as there is. Continued good weather is cheering up the laying hens, it seems, and though eggs are bringing only 20 cents, they are coming forward in great quantities.

Flour is reported to be coming down in Portland, the reduction being expected there today.

Pendleton, March 2.—Reports received here by wire today show further declines in the wheat market with still lower prices predicted. In Portland the price of \$1.25 was again bid for spot club and \$1.15 for Red Russian. In the Chicago market today May club had dropped to \$1.42 from a quotation of \$1.48 1-4 yesterday. July club in Chicago sold at \$1.16.

H. W. Collins, of Balfour-Guthrie Co., who returned this morning from Portland says the blockade is the chief factor in forcing lower wheat prices. The risks are so great that charterers have gone very high. In Portland windjammers are now selling at 80 shillings and steamer charters are even higher.

The attack on the Dardanelles is a factor in the market also and it is predicted that when the allies force the passage of the Dardanelles the bears will further depress the market on the strength of the Russian supply to be then made available.

Pendleton Mar. 1.—Col J. H. Raley today completed the deal whereby Joe Cuhna of Echo becomes the owner of the 3,400-acre Raley-Crow pasture at the head of Bell Cow, south of Meacham.

Supervisory System May Be Abandoned.

Pendleton Feb. 29.—In all probability the county school supervisory system will be abandoned in Umatilla county the first of July, according to Supt. I. E. Young. Though the Dimick bill, as passed by the legislature, leaves it optional with the county whether or not the system shall be retained, Supt. Young thinks it will be abolished here at the expiration of J. A. Yeager's term in July.

Under the law as passed, the directors of the various districts decide for or against the system. A majority petition can either abolish or establish the office. Supt. Young believes a repeal of the supervisory system mandatory would have been preferable to the present one inasmuch as under the present law, a supervisor would work under a disadvantage.

Farmer Stricken With Paralysis.

Pendleton Feb. 27.—Dave Van Skiver, a farmer of the eastern country was stricken with paralysis of one side while standing by the American National Bank building about 10 o'clock this forenoon. He fell over on the steps and on being picked up was taken to the office of Dr. T. M. Henderson where he was given medical care. He was then removed to the St. Anthony's hospital where he still remains. This afternoon his condition was given no improvement.

Mr. Van Skiver formerly farmed in the Holdman section and sold out his land there to purchase a farm near Weston. He is an Odd Fellow and was in attendance at the I. O. O. F. convention in Weston last night, coming down to Pendleton with the local delegation of three linkers.

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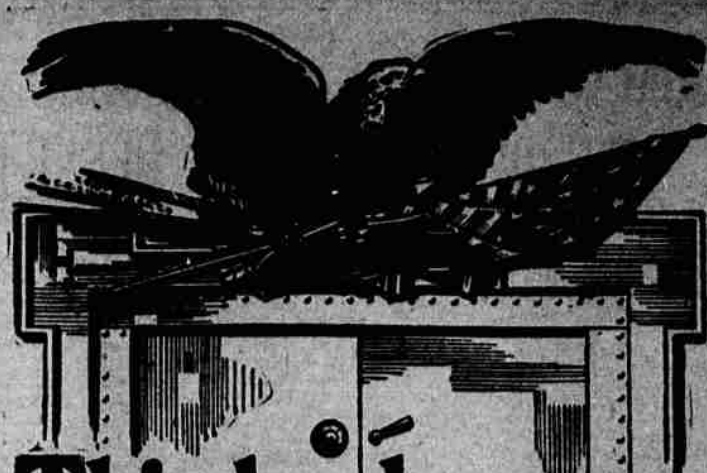
