Backing him up are Pat Reagan, Aitchison, Brown, Schmutz, and the usual quota of recruits, including Appleton of Fort Worth, Cadore of Wilkesbarre, Chabek of Harrisburg, Dell of Seattle, Donald of Waco, Goodbred of Oshkosh, Howell of the Chattanooga club, and Smith of Newark. All of them have records better than usual.

Behind the bat Robinson has Otto Miller and McCarty, and to help out he has Snow, of Oshkosh, and Mack Wheat, a brother of Zach Wheat, the Dodgers' heavy hitting outfielder. Dalton's place in the outfield probably will be filled by "Hi" Myers, amassed a batting average of .286 in seventy games last season. Casey Stengel and Zach Wheat will work on either side of him unless Zimmerman, a Newark recruit, grabs their jobs, which is about as probable as the Naps winning the American league pennant.

Jake Daubert will undoubtedly be on first base again and in all probability Cuthshaw will cover second. For short, O'Mara will win back his position. Gus Gotz, who played third

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last year, may have to put up a stiff battle to stay there. Schultz, a recruit, has put in a bid for the job. He played in 155 games for Rochester last year and emerged with a batting average of .316. Hummel and Dick Egan supply the utility positions.

The only place in which the Brookfeds have been materially strengthened is at second base. Lee Magee, the new manager, is going to cavort thereabout, and if he performs as he did with the Cards, it should be a large factor in their upward struggle. Magee's leadership, too, must be reckoned with. Bill Bradley last year was a disappointment as manager, and did not get the best work out of his men, according to the Wards. Magee undoubtedly will.

Tom Seaton heads Magee's array of twirlers. Comment on his work is unnecessary. Jim Bluejacket, the big Indian recruit, should prove a bear now that he has had the experience of a part of a year with the Brookfeds. Nick Cullop is expected to do better than last season and Byron Black, late of the Athletics, should slip over a few wins. Eddie Laftie was a good man last year. The others are Finneran, Wilson, Upham, Marion, Peters, Somers, Chappelle and Juul.

"Hap" Myers will probably hold down first base again. Magee will go to second, Eddie Gagner to short and Tex Westerville to third. DeLahanty and Holtz will fill in as they are needed.

Magee has an outfield he is expecting much of. Steve Evans was a bear with the stick last season. He is backed up by Claude Cooper, late of the Giants, and Eddie Murphy, the old Athletic captain. Anderson will sub Griggs, Chouinard and Walsh will also be carried. Mike Simon, Grover Land and a Mr. Watson form the receiving staff.
