The organ in Orchestra hall is by no means easy to handle, but the gifted performer from Utah mastered its secrets with impressive results. His abilities as executant and his possession of a profound understanding of registration were in their unfolding well worth a journey to this concert." "McClellan played the great F Major Toccata from Widor's sixth organ symphony, and played it admirably indeed. An Andantino of Temare—a piece of unspeakable saccharinity—was hardly worth playing at all, but the organist's excellent performance gave a factitious value to the work." (Mr. McClellan was on this occasion soloist with Mormon Tabernacle choir on its New York tour.)

SWIFT A MEMORY WIZARD

BAKER MAN RECALLS BY VISUALIZATION METHOD.

Recalls Name of Every County in Oregon With Ease.

Washington, D. C., March 2.—(Special Observer Special Correspondence).—Few men in the United States have a memory equal to that of A. V. Swift, of Baker, Oregon, who spent a few days in the capital a short time ago attending a meeting of the executive board of the Farmers' Co-operative and Educational Union of America of which he is a member. Mr. Swift can name every county in the United States and tell its county seat. He performs this wonderful feat by a process of visualization. As soon as the county is named an image of its shape appears in his mind. He says all of the counties are shaped differently, and thus the feat of remembering the hundreds of the same is not so very difficult after all. When it is remembered, however, that the list of postoffices by counties in the U. S. Postal guide covers 140 pages, one is apt to consider it not too light a feat of mental gymnastics, after all.
