BRISK TONE IN SALES, AND BUILDINGS.

Residence to Go Up on First—Several Properties Sold.

Brisk sales, actual and contemplated, and several changes in city realty properties, start off the month of March in this city. Mr. and Mrs. Crouthers have purchased the D. K. Ward place on First street, between L and M avenues. The property is provided with a fine bungalow.

On the north side, Lowry Larson has sold his five-room house located at Greenwood and Y avenue to Wm. C. Davis. The feature about these two sales is that they were entirely cash basis transactions, with very substantial payments down.

Mrs. Nellie McMakin has purchased the Gilman lot between the George Cochran and Gilman residences on First between Main and Washington, and in April a \$3,000 bungalow is to go up on that site. This is considered one of the choice building sites in that end of the city.

TWO INDIANS JAILED.

One Sells Liquor to Another and Both Get Into Trouble.

Pendleton, March 8.—One Indian sold to another liquor and now both are to sojourn in jail awhile. Ed Chapman and Charley Shaplish (Whirlwind) are the Indians in question. The former was yesterday afternoon given the maximum sentence allowed by the city ordinance, \$50 fine and 20 days in jail, and is now doing work with the street gang. He was convicted of selling liquor to Shaplish and Shaplish is alleged to have taken the liquor on too the reservation. A bench warrant was issued for him from the federal court in Portland and he will be tried there. This is the fourth time he has been to Portland on this charge.

Incidentally, Judge Fitz Gerald has declared war upon the Indians who continually solicit liquor and intends punishing them along with the bootleggers. His decision arose from the appearance in court this morning of one Elmer F. Martin, a cigarmaker, who recently came here from Salem. Martin was arrested for giving liquor to Jim Kanine, an Indian, and in court stated that Kanine had asked him to get the liquor and that he had done it without pay because the Indian had "staked" him to a meal when he first arrived in town. Martin was sentenced to pay a \$25 fine or spend 12 days in jail, while Kanine was given five days on a vagrancy charge.

The city ordinance makes it an offense for an Indian to solicit liquor as well as for any one to furnish it to them. However, because the Indian's testimony is generally necessary to convict the bootlegger, little effort has been made to enforce this provision. The Indians, instead of being punished for their offense have actually profited by it inasmuch as they are paid witness fees. Hereafter, Judge Fitz Gerald announced that Indians who persistently solicit liquor will be prosecuted.

Probably no spot in Oregon looks upon Prof. J. J. McClellan with quite the same feeling of admiration that La Grande does. When he comes here March 19 as organist and accompanist for Miss Felice Lyne when that operatic star gives her concert to this city at popular prices he will have many in his audience at the L. D.
