

WALLOWA 5 DISBANDED

LA GRANDE CLAIMS GAME BY FORFEITURE.

Track Season Coming to the Front
Rapidly Once More.

Wallowa has refused to play a return game with La Grande, and Coach Olson, still offering to meet the gladiators from Wallowa, contends that failure on their part to come here and play the game, is equal to forfeiture. The Cove game is also hanging fire, and unless Cove comes to play the regularly scheduled game, the La Grande five will claim it by forfeiture. The La Granders don't know whether to lay their suits away for good or not; Wallowa has asked to be excused, and it is reported the Cove team members have mumps, so it is hard to say when Cove will get ready to play though the season is already past. The situation here is that neither the team nor coach knows just where one season is going to end and where track work takes up.

Wallowa, March 9.—(Special).—The track prospects for the coming year are very good, though several of the members of last year's team have graduated. These are: Atherton, Hayes, Powers, F. Southwick, Hendericks, and James. But there are several new men for this year, among them being Kay and Marvin from Enterprise, and Bright from Lostine. Bright won both the half and quarter mile runs at the county meet, last year, and Kay tied for third in the high jump, at the Eastern Oregon meet. Bishop has not had much experience in field meets, but should make a good showing with the weights this year. Besides the new men, there are several of last year's track team left, and three are many who did not make the track team last year who will try for places now.

Enterprise forfeited the basketball game with Wallowa, which was to have been played at Enterprise Saturday, and so basketball practice was dropped at once, and Friday a meeting was held, at which all those who are intending to try for the team were present. Mr. Botts had each one write down the events which he is going to try for, and in this way he can get a line on them, and direct them in the ways of training for the different events. The weather is a little cool yet, and so until about about the 20th of the month, the training will consist of cross country running for all. After that, each member of the squad will train for the different events he wants to try for.

Some good practice for the northwest tournament will be given the locals through the fact that both the La Grande and Portland teams have asked for matches here en route to Spokane. To help finance the trip, the bowlers will give a dancing party in the Eagle-Woodman hall and will sell tickets on the street tomorrow for this dance.

An inter-class cross country run will be held.

Though no claims are being made that Wallowa will win the Track championship of Eastern Oregon they expect to put a team in the field which will be a credit to the school.

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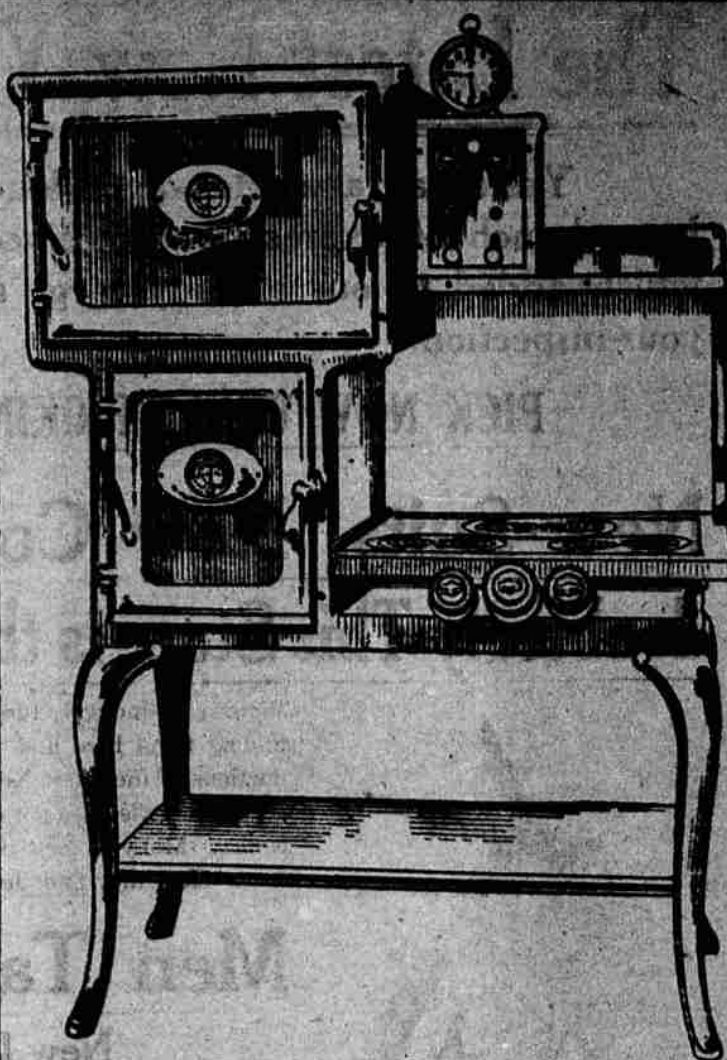
