NO OFFERINGS MADE AT PORTLAND YESTERDAY.

Kansas City Showed a Trace of Weakness Yesterday, However.

Portland, March 10.—Not a single head of live stock entered the North Portland yards, available for the open market, yesterday, the only shipment being a mixed load of hogs and cattle from Estacada direct to the Union Meat company.

Conditions in the hog trade continue firm here. Naturally, with no offerings for the day, no new prices were established and the trade in general inclines to the opinion that full prices will be realized for the immediate future.

At Chicago there was a steady tone in the hog trade, with tops at \$7.00.

Kansas City hog market showed a trace of weakness, with values off a nickel and tops at \$7.00.

Omaha hog market ruled steady a nickel better, with tops at \$6.75.

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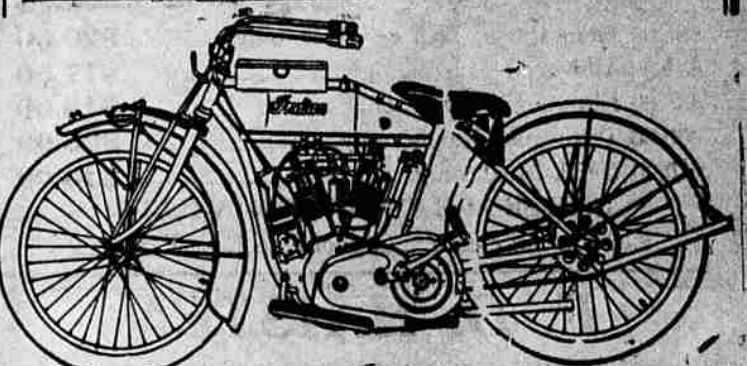
