Municipal Plant a Success.

Cleveland, O., Mar 11.—Operating against the private owned corporation at lower rates, Cleveland's municipal electric light plant earned a net profit of \$48,675 in 1914, according to figures just compiled by Light Commissioner Ballard. The municipal plant serves 10,000 customers and is adding rapidly to this number. Its rate is three cents per kilowatt hour. The private owned corporation charges from five to ten cents, gauged on the amount used by the consumer.
