Of the home coming in Kansas City, the Kansas City Journal says, in its introductory paragraph: "K. C. Journal Oct 8 1912.—'If Felice Lyne, the latest and greatest of the artists whom Kansas City has given to the operatic world, was not as happy last night as her first name implies she is, the fault was not with the splendid audience of 6,000 persons in Convention hall who gave her a demonstrative welcome, both as artist and Kansas Cityan."

"She deserved the welcome strictly on her merits as the former and no allowances had to be made for the fact that she sang as the latter, to those applauding thousands of her townspeople. For hers was the same

ample and convincing art which conquered audiences of strangers across the water only a few months ago and it was a pleasing coincidence that her first number was the beautiful solo which paved the way for the triumphant success of her London debut.

"So far as numbers and receipts are concerned, Miss Lyne's concert last night broke all records for Kansas City, with the possible exception of the Bernhardt performance. It easily established the concert record, for none of the great artists who have been heard here drew either so many people or so many dollars as Miss Lyne."

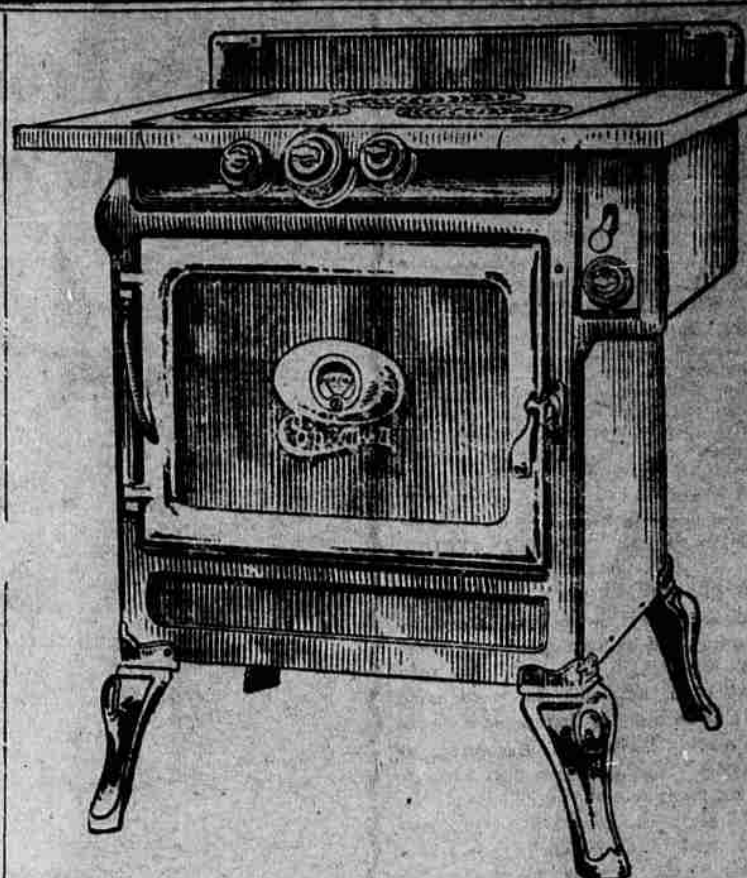
Old Friends.
