CRUSHER WILL OPERATE AGAIN

SEVERAL ORDERS TO BE FILLED AT ONCE.

Repair to Streets and Roads Necessitates Run of Rock Crusher.

After a prolonged idleness, the Home Construction Company rock crusher west of the city is to be operated again. A crew of 10 or 12 men will be put to work within a week, which is the shortest possible time that the big plant can be put in order.

John L. Mars, manager of the company, today closed arrangements with the city for crushed rock to be used in repairing and maintaining North Second, North Fir and the east and west ends of Adams avenue. The county also has need of crushed rock, and when these orders have been filled, Mr. Mars will fill what bin space he has. The result will be a long run for the crusher.

"We will rush the repairs on the plant and put the crew to work with all possible speed," said Manager Mars today.

NEW FIRM IS TO OPEN HERE

WHOLESALE AND PRODUCE BUSINESS FORMS.

W. G. Sawyer and D. M. Clarke Will Form Partnership.

A new business firm was formed today when D. M. Clarke and W. G. Sawyer entered into the company to be known as the Sawyer-Clarke Co. These gentlemen have leased the Harrington warehouse at the corner of Jefferson and Greenwood streets, where they will have ample room for the large business they will build.

Cement, plaster, lime, fuel, feed, produce, vegetables, tropical fruits, building materials, will be some of the lines handled and in addition to these a general storage and forwarding business will be carried on. It is likely the new firm will install a chop mill at an early date.

Mr. Clarke is well known in business circles in the Grande Ronde valley, having been connected with different enterprises here and at Cove for the past 20 years. He has been a heavy buyer of produce of the valley and is well known by every producer.

Mr. Sawyer has been here for 12 years and during that time developed one of the first class ranches of the valley which he sold last fall. The combination of these two men seems to be very good and it is quite likely they will build a business of large volume.

arranged for a special officer to work unknown to the police and to the firemen with a view to catching the joker.

"The firemen are also getting tired of the false alarm business as it tends to bring the department into disrepute and causes the firemen to be accused of having turned in the alarms so they may be called out.

A further step that may be taken is the installment of an attachment at each box so that when a man turns in an alarm he will stay right in his tracks until the department arrives. An apparatus will clutch his hands and hold him fast until the fire chief can unlock him. Such an attachment is used on the fire boxes at Seattle and does away with the false alarms.

Postmaster to Receive Raise.

Baker, March 12.—John G. Foster, who will take charge of the Baker postoffice within the next week or so, is congratulating himself on the fact that he will receive a \$100 raise over the salary which the present incumbent W. J. Lachner, has been drawing. Mr. Foster's yearly salary is to be \$2800.

The postmaster's salary is based on the postal receipts, and for the year ending March 21, according to the showing made the previous year, receipts will total over \$30,000 the dividing line between a \$2,700 and a \$2,800 salary.

Mr. Lachner started in eight years ago with his salary at \$2500, and since that time he has been given two raises of \$100 each.
