## HOG RUN IS DECREASING

### DECREASE IN CATTLE SENT IN ALSO NOTED

Sharp Advances in Mutton Reported  
from Portland Yards

Union Stockyards, North Portland, March 15.—Another decrease in the run of cattle was shown at North Portland at the opening of the week's trade. There were arrivals from four states—Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Utah. Some excellent pulp fed stuff came forward and sold early in the trade at \$7.75 or the extreme price of last week, with hay fed showing no change in values.

General conditions in the cattle trade are extremely healthy at North Portland although the market is not

yet showing the great strength indicated in other lines.

One special feature was noticeable in the swine trade here today. That was the fact that the big run of hogs has been over for some time. Today's run consisted of but 939 head compared with 1720 head last Monday, 950 a year ago and 2492 head this same day two years ago.

Killers are not getting sufficient hogs at the present time to fill their requirements, therefore there is much added competition for the more limited offerings.

Sharp advances were forced in the price list of all mutton and lamb offerings today at North Portland as forecasted in these reports recently. Top lambs moved 35c higher to \$8.35 with yearlings, wethers and ewes each showing a rise of 25c.
