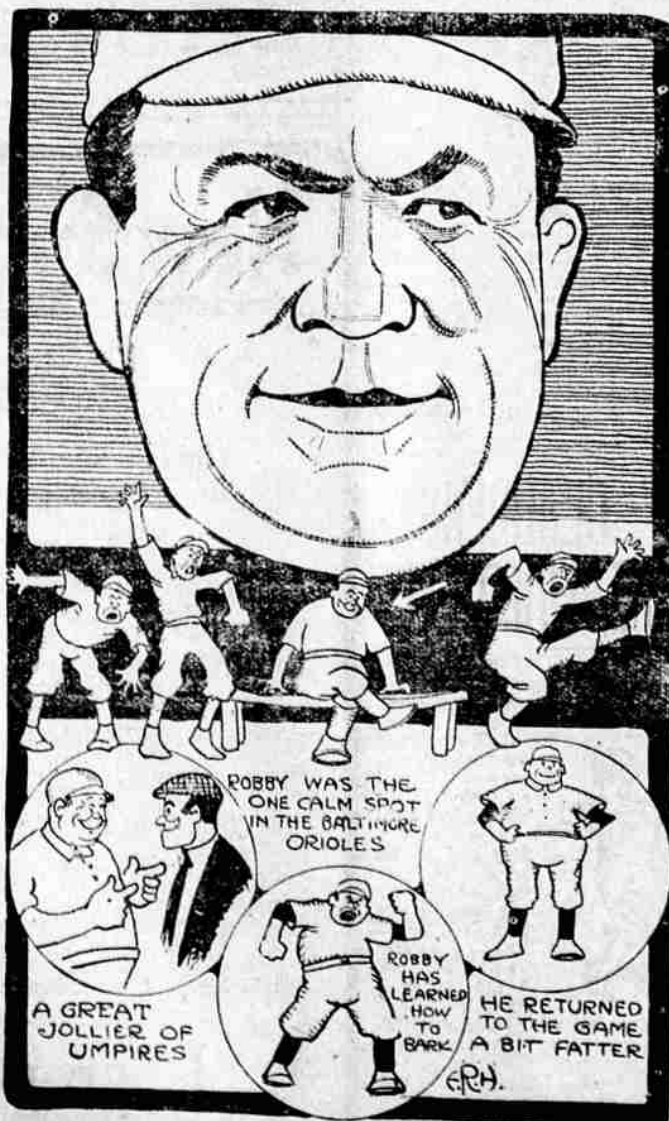
500 DRUGGISTS TARDY.

Miller, collector of internal revenue, at the Custom-House in Portland prior to March 1, as required by law, there are at least 500 tardy ones in this state who have not yet complied with the terms of the act, and as a special favor the office is accepting registrations for the remainder of this month, permission having been

obtained from Washington. It is urged by Collector Miller that all who are amenable to the law observe it strictly, as heavy penalties are provided in all cases of failure, says a Portland paper which goes on to state that a fine of \$2000 or imprisonment for five years are the maximum punishments stated in the law for violators. The act was passed last December by Congress, and is designed to check the distribution of opium, coca leaves and their derivatives. Physicians, druggists and all who have legitimate use for these drugs are required strictly to account for each sale. The impression is said to be general among many physicians that special prescription blanks are required in handling them, but this is not the case, says Collector Miller, usual blanks being allowed, provided all other provisions of the act are observed.

It is required that a strict record be kept of all drugs of the nature included in the act that are dispensed, and this record must be kept for a period of two years following the date of sale. Meanwhile, it will be subject to inspection.

At Preest there are three and one-half million trees growing in the forest Service nurseries of Washington and Oregon. This number is sufficient to plant five thousand acres of burned over land. One and one-half million of these trees will be shipped out this spring for planting on the National Forests of Oregon and Washington.

The Forest Service plans to plant trees this spring upon a thousand acres of burned over land on Mt. Hebo in Tillamook County, Oregon. A crew of fifty men will be employed.



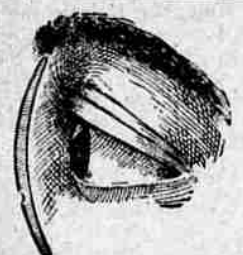
