GRANDE RONDE PROJECT READY

CLASSIFICATION FIGURES REACH OFFICE

Cost of Clearing Burned—Over Area Is Comparatively Small

The Forest Supervisor at Walla Walla, Wash., has received word of the classifications, by the Secretary of Agriculture, of lands on the Wenaha National Forest known as the Grande Ronde Project.

The tract comprises approximately 19,250 acres, all surveyed land, in T 3 N, R 40 E, T 4 N, R 39 E, and T 4 N, R 40 E, W. M. The land lies in the northeastern corner of the state of Oregon, just west of the Grande Ronde River, on a high plateau twenty miles north of Elgin, Oregon, on the Joseph branch of the O. W. R. & N. R. R. The elevation of this plateau is from 4000 to 4800 feet, and that of the river bottom or valley from 2000 to 2250 feet.

The area has been carefully examined by qualified officers of the Department of Agriculture. As a result of this examination, the Secretary has classified two large tracts in T 4 N, R 39 and 40 E, amounting to approximately 2,432 acres as chiefly valuable for agriculture and not needed for forest purposes. According to this report, these two tracts were badly burned in years past, there is relatively little timber upon them, and the cost of clearing would be low. This area, therefore, of 2,432 acres will be listed with the Secretary of the Interior for opening to settlement and entry. It is stated that these agricultural lands have already been applied for under the homestead act, and will be opened to entry in the names of the preferred applicants. The remainder of the land in the Project, it is said, is chiefly valuable for forest purposes and cannot be opened to entry under the Act of June 11, 1906.

Famous Outlaw in Hiding.

Tulsa, Okla., Mar. 18.—Hiding in the Osage hills, northwest of Tulsa, with a price of \$1,000 on his head is Henry Starr, decedent of "Belle" Starr, the most dashing woman outlaw of western pioneer history. Starr is specifically charged in the state's offer of the reward with having robbed the Carney State Bank of \$2,853 last December, eleven bank robberies, during the highest degree, have been perpetrated in Oklahoma and other nearby states with in a year and the hunt for Starr is the beginning of a determined effort by the authorities to wipe out this class of crime.

Starr was convicted of murder in the early Indian Territory days and afterwards spent his time at the Leavenworth federal prison until pardoned by President Roosevelt. Starr served prison terms in Kansas, Oklahoma and Colorado. In 1913 he was paroled from the Colorado penitentiary. He broke the parole and resumed his career as bank robber, detective claim. They assert he could explain the robberies in Kiefer, Carney, Keystone and Rader Springs (Kan.) Oil town gambling houses have also been a fruitful scene of his robbing activities.

New Phase Develops.

Washington, March 18.—While legal experts of the state department are examining the law and precedents, the administration is marking time in the international situation growing from the allied blockade in Germany. The allies took the position when they established the long-range blockade in the kaiser's country, that neutral countries are bound to respect it as "airtight." They call it a blockade which the law makes proper. This has raised a new point which President Wilson desires to clear up before taking further steps in negotiations with Britain.

Washington, March 18.—Rear Admiral Fiske and Robert Lansing the counselor for the state department, held three conferences in Lansing's office today; after which Fiske hurried to Secretary Daniels' office. It is believed preparations are made for a 24-hour ultimatum to Captain Thierichens of the cruiser Eitel, to repair his ship immediately or return.

Mrs. Knapper Resting Well.

Mrs. Knapper of Joseph who was brought to the Grande Ronde hospital from Joseph last evening suffering with an acute attack of appendicitis, is reported to be resting more easily today. The crisis will be reached tomorrow it is expected.

COMMISSION IN SESSION

REPORTS FILED AND READ BY COMMISSION.

Report of Manager Covers Work Transacted During Week.

Hearing reports from various officers and fixing a new salary for the city engineer, made up the main portion of the city commission's work last evening. All commissioners were present. President Russell presiding. The salary for the city engineer was cut to \$100 and \$185 per month.

General manager's report for the week ending March 13th:

The police arrested eight besides three arrests for the state. Three drunks, one disorderly, one traffic violator and paroled one. Five remained in jail. Served twenty-nine meals. Collected \$20.00 fines. Eight lights out. There were 25 sleepers. Received \$1238.88 from sale of property for delinquent assessments.

No fires last week.

The street superintendent spent \$184.55 on the streets of which \$49.00 was prison labor. Cleaned up west Adams and Fir macadam and hauled off the refuse and mud scraped up by the grader. Also did work on North Second. Washed the streets in the business section. Graded up and smoothed Palmer avenue from Fourth street around to Second.

The water superintendent had two men repairing meters, meter boxes etc. Also installed 12 feet of 4 inch pipe accidentally broken by sewer diggers. Total expenditure \$35.50 for the week.

The recorder received \$20.00 fines, \$8.35 septic tank farm rent, \$1.50 for three building permits, \$19.00 dog tax, \$34.33 installments in District No. 67, \$21.12 interest on same, \$10.00 on District No. 1-A, \$43.58 on District No. 13-B, with \$5.86 interest on same; \$20.35 from Eastern Oregon Light & Power Co. for expense of keeping creek channel open during the freeze. Also received \$24.44 principal and \$4.30 interest on Sewer District 1, Section No. 1; \$114.20 sale and certificate District No. 13-B, interest \$13.17, advertising \$1.88, cost of two certificates \$1.00.

The recorder drew warrants for \$2168.04 for bills allowed; \$9.30 for new bills allowed; \$73.17 for labor certificates; \$107.35 for library vouchers 260 to 263. Turned 6 bonds on Sewer District No. 2, Section No. 3 amounting to \$2956.34 to Mr. Childs the contractor as per resolution heretofore passed.

The treasurer received \$676.95 water rent; \$180.42 improvement installments; \$224.10 improvement district interest; \$9.50 interest on district No. 88 and \$1.00 for two electrical permits. He paid \$164.70 water warrants; \$107.35 library warrant; \$344.29 improvement district interest; \$1124.68 revolving fund warrants in payment of the properties bid in by the city at the delinquent sale. The treasurer paid \$3150.00 and \$71.92 interest on warrants on sewer district No. 2, section No. 3 or \$3221.92 in all. The bonds amounting to \$2956.34 and \$67.50 accrued interest were turned over to the contractor. Thus only \$189.08 was required to close the transaction.

Total delinquent sales of the 5 properties were \$1238.88. One property sold for full charges and costs and interest or \$114.30. The rest were bid in by the city for full charges, costs, interest and penalty at \$1124.68 for which full returns are before you.
