E. church, was interred in the Summerville cemetery. The deceased is survived by the wife and six children, the youngest being a baby less than one year old and the oldest a married daughter, the wife of the O. W. R. & N. operator here. Harry Waddell. Mr. Johnson spent practically his entire life in this valley and was a skilled machanic.

New York Buildings At Frisco Dedicated

San Francisco, Mar. 19.—The New York building at the Panama Pacific Exposition was dedicated today with elaborate ceremonies attended by the governor of California, the mayor of San Francisco, all the high dignitaries of the Exposition company and more than a score of prominent New Yorkers.

Seth Low, president of the National Civic Federation represented Gov. Whitman at the exercises and was the speaker of the day. He was accompanied to San Francisco by Adjt. Gen. Stotesbury of the New York National Guard, as aide.

Nearly all of the 18 commissioners from New York State were present

when the ceremonies opened. Norman E. Mack, Buffalo, chairman of the New York State Commission, presided. He spoke briefly and introduced president Charles C. Moore, of the Exposition Co, who formerly presented to the exposition commissioners the plaque showing their participation in the big fair. He also voiced the thanks of the exposition management for the Empire States support. Mayor Rolph of San Francisco and Gov. Johnson of California then spoke briefly, as did Wm. B. Lamar, chairman of the federal commission to the fair.

The ceremonies took place in front of the New York building, one of the handsomest on the grounds. Gov. Whitman, of New York, and his staff are expected to visit the Exposition in May.
