ORGAN WIZARD COMES TO CITY

Prof. John J. McClellan, the organ wizard, known abroad and at home as one of the foremost pipe organ masters in the profession today, arrived this morning from Salt Lake to accompany Felice Lyne tonight at the L. D. S. tabernacle when she appears in concert. Though tired and worn from a strenuous past fortnight, Prof. McClellan always perks up his ears and his spirits revive when he reaches La Grande; a city he has visited twice before on music bent, and although the organ master is extremely modest, it must be interpolated at this point that there are a great many here who are as pleased to have him come as he is to be here. Bounteous sunshine and hosts of friends in the L. D. S. church and out of it, did not suffice to keep him from his duty and after breakfast at the Jay Van Buren home he and Miss Lyne rehearsed for the concert tonight.

As previously inferred Mr. McClellan is an extremely modest man, for one so great, and to interview him on a day like this is a diplomatic stunt for his comments and his remarks presently twist around Miss Lyne for whom he was accompanist at Salt Lake last Friday night. La Grande has heard professor McClellan perform ere this and is in love with him, and of course will greet his overture this evening with a great deal of pleasure. But his interviewer this morning threw up his hands in hopelessness in trying to inveigle Mr. McClellan into saying something of himself for his conversation just would get back to Felice.

Prof. Stephens Enraptured
"Let me tell you something that I know. When Miss Lyne had concluded her Salt Lake concert, Prof. Stephens the man who has lead the Mormon tabernacle choir at Salt Lake for nearly two decades, and has heard and knows personally nearly all the vocal celebrities, said: "Miss Lyne I want to say that I have never heard such perfect vocal demonstration as you gave us. Perhaps you have not thrilled me as probably Nordica did with her great voice, but for perfect poise and technical perfection your work is art perfect."

Now maybe you don't know that Prof. Stephens is a merciless critic. When he says anything he means it. I know something about music and vocal artists and I too am enraptured with her musical ability. Why, just the other day at Salt Lake she didn't like the way I executed a certain turn at the piano and the girl showed me how it should be done. "Papa getting some lessons don't you know."

to Salt Lake he will play the organ for the biggest trained choir ever congregated in the west. March 24 the tabernacle is to be re-dedicated and 1800 voices are going to sing under the direction of Prof. Stephens—by the way Stephens lead the Mormon choir when it was here a few years ago. "When the 900-voice male chorus in that choir sings, it is simply grand" said Mr. McClellan in speaking of the coming event.

STODDARD IS HOME.

It is such demonstrations that convince one that Germans and Austrians are enthusiastic and patriotic.

"At various points in my effort to get to England I was arrested and would be held until some one would arrive who could read my passport. The mere fact that it was American invariably raised suspicions of the guards who could not read it."

"By a slow process I finally got to Rotterdam three months ago, having seen as much and been as near the firing as I care to be. My camera pictures, gems of all of them, were taken from me by censors."

"After three months in England I started home just before the blockade became effected, and a few days after the Lusitania flew the American flag. We sailed from Liverpool amid great excitement on the St. Paul, and the Lusitania followed in our way to be on the outlook for trouble. We had none and excitement died down on getting out of the Irish channel."

Mr. Stoddard affirms that the English realize full well that they have a hard proposition on their hands, but never for a moment admit of the possibility of defeat. Germans on the other hand, realize the odds they are fighting against, but there too, defeat is not thought of as a possibility.
