North Powder, Union and Elgin Clippings Compiled.

(North Powder News) Solan's New Dwelling

O. H. Sloan has just completed the cement walls of the basement to a nine-room dwelling which he is erecting on his lots adjoining his undertaking parlors.

The main structure will be 28 feet by 34 feet, two stories above a 7 1/2 foot basement, which is 12x18 and will be used for a kitchen. There will be six rooms on the second floor and two on the third besides an enclosed sleeping porch. The entire structure will be of Douglas fir, the walls three-ply with the heaviest fire proof-building paper between each ply. Taking it as a whole it will be one of the best dwelling houses in the city.

In the case at law of Hewitt Bros. vs. A. C. Spain, the jury found a verdict for the plaintiff.

The case was called at ten o'clock Wednesday morning, before Justice May, the plaintiff being represented by Mr. Drahan, of La Grande, and A. E. Lambert of this city. The defendant was represented by H. L. Hess of this city. It took until afternoon at one o'clock to empanel the jury, which was composed of the following: O. H. Sloan, Grant Dalton,

There were twelve witnesses for the plaintiff and nine for the defendant. After a somewhat strenuous battle the case was given to the jury, who after thirty minutes deliberation rendered a verdict in favor of the plaintiff and ordered the property in dispute, five head of sheep, to be turned over to the plaintiffs.

The defense gave a verbal notice of an appeal to the circuit court. The costs of the suit, outside of attorney fees and the costs of a prior action, were \$55.25.

The Tinney Dairy is preparing to erect a 12x14 cement milk house. The walls will be eight feet high and a foot thick with cement floor which will make it one of the best in the vicinity. This dairy is doing good business and their product is the very best.

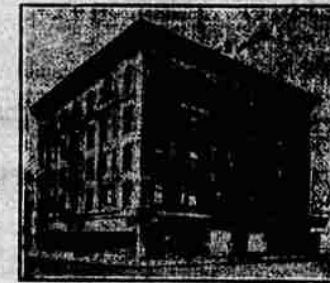
