CATTLE HOLD UP STEADILY

BETTER RUN OF HOGS OVER SUNDAY

Offerings in Mutton Continue to Decrease Each Week

Portland Stockyards, March 22.—There was a somewhat better run of hogs than expected in the North Portland yards over Sunday but early in the trading one sale was made at \$7.60, the former top, although the bulk of the good stuff went below this price.

Steadiness continues reflected in the cattle situation at North Portland with a fair increase over last Monday's showing. Sales of good stuff were again made this morning at \$7.50 in the steer division with the general price range during the early trading showing practically no change from last week's closing.

Every week recently there has been a decrease in offerings of mutton and lambs on the local market despite the fact that values here have shown a very liberal increase. The finished stricken trade was quick to take hold of the limited offerings available in the local yards this morning and all through the trade unusually strong prices prevailed.

HERMISTON MAN ACCUSED

Wealthy Resident Accused of Misleading Girl of 17 Years

Pendleton March 23.—Charged with soliciting and procuring a child under eighteen years of age, William B. White, a young rancher of Hermiston who is said to be wealthy, is in the custody of the sheriff pending arrangements to furnish a bond of \$1500 fixed this morning by Justice of the Peace Joe H. Parkes. The complaining witness is Walter Botkin, stepfather of the girl involved.

White was arrested Saturday by Deputy Sheriff J. A. Blekely and brought to Pendleton, and this morning was arraigned. His attorneys are Col J. H. Raley and Judge James A. Fee.

It is charged by the complaining witness that White recently enticed the girl, who is 17 years old, to his home and kept her over night. The girl is said to have told the story that led to the filing of the charge. The girl and her mother, it is said, through shame and fear of notoriety, fled several days ago from their home but were located Saturday out in the country from Hermiston by the officers. The stepfather, it is said, is much aroused and is determined upon pressing the charges.
