ORGAN PEALS BEAUTIFUL TONES AT CONCERT.

La Grande Men Help to Round Out Delightful Organ Recital.

Once more Prof. John McClellan of Salt Lake has hypnotized a La Grande audience. His appearance last evening under the auspices of the M. I. A. was a musical feast that a considerable crowd partook of. Prof. McClellan arrived on the evening train from Spokane, and several minutes elapsed after 8:30 before the concert got under way, but the crowd was patient and well rewarded.

The organ master used a combination of masterpieces that are to be included in the introductory program in a long series to be given at the Panama exposition, and Prof. McClellan displays mighty fine taste in the arrangement. His wonderful control over the organ, his genius on organ and piano alike, his undisputed superiority over the top notch performers of the country have been conclusively established.

The La Grande male quartet, singing with even more than its customary skill and satisfaction to its audience, was on the program last evening. Messrs. Ferrin, Howland, Stoddard and Bramwell, who comprise the quartet, were called back for more most persistently. Mr. Ferrin also sang a tenor solo with a great deal of feeling, his number being well received.

Two Men Cronies.

It is a peculiar coincident probably, but nevertheless a fact that when Mr. McClellan played Mr. Ferrin's accompaniment last evening, the two men were again rehearsing old scenes. The two were close friends in Berlin at one time, and because of their musical traits, were thrown together a great deal. Each swears by the other even now, and they are close friends.
