ECKLEY RANKS HIGH

Comes Well Toward the Top of Scholastic Honors at O. A. C.

Winfield Eckley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Eckley of this city, ranks high in academic work at O. A. C. Recently he was elected to an honorary engineering society purely on his merits as a student, and now his semester marks have been compiled.

At the close of the first semester each year there is compiled in the O. A. C. registrar's office a list of students whose scholastic standing places them at the top of the list as "students." The scholastic honor roll for the semester just closed has been compiled on the basis of the number of credits of work for which students received a grade of "A," which is equivalent to 96 per cent. Since the average student carries about 17 credits of work, there was taken approximately 12½ credits, as the proximately minimum number which would be condition of being placed on the honor roll

any student who has completed with the third classification, being one of a grade of 96 per cent a number of 12 in that class.

Jail Makes Them Nervous.

Trenton, N. 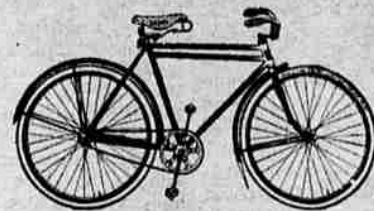
