CLEANUP DAY DURING APRIL

SPECIAL FIRE PERMIT GIVEN OVER TELEPHONE

Condition of Beaver Creek Water Supply Discussed.

Promoting the city beautiful campaign to its greatest possible force, the city commissioners last evening discussed the matter of a cleanup day to be set for about the middle of April. Between now and that date anyone wishing a fire permit to burn rubbish may obtain it by telephoning to the city recorder's office. This is done to avoid calls coming in on the fire station telephone that might work to the disadvantage of the department, and while Fire Chief Benham will continue to keep records of the fires, all telephone applications must go to the recorder's office.

The commission met last evening and discussed various projects and movements, among them the situation at Beaver Creek. Water Superintendent L. M. Hoyt has returned from the intake and reports that Coal Creek is still frozen up but that snow is gone from the South slopes, and the North slopes are still blanketed knee deep. The pipeline is in good condition and is running full head of water. Every indication points to a dry summer and water shortage may have to be conducted with.

The Independent Telephone company applied to the commission for the right to build a temporary garage in the rear of its office on Adams.

Considerable routine matter pertaining to reports, etc., were gone over and disposed of by the commissioners. General manager's report for the week ending March 20, 1915:

To the commission, Gentlemen: The water superintendent spent \$37.75 on repair work, taps, etc. The pipe crew laid 316 feet of four-inch pipe at the Park at a cost of \$81.42.

The police arrested 16, besides six Chinamen, and one other state case. Four drunks, four disorderly, one traffic violator, and one boot-legger. Convicted six, paroled one, dismissed one, in jail three; served 18 meals and two in state cases. Fines \$20. Three lights out; nine sleepers. Three head of stock and one dog impounded. Three dollars pound fees paid for two head, and one escaped. The Noodle grill on Fir street finally removed the partition so frequently complained of. The management was informed that the way things were run, it would be held a violation of the ordinances.

The street superintendent spent \$221.40, including \$56.00 prison labor. He spent \$25.00 in the basement. This included \$14.00 prison work. Out of the total \$180.40 including \$42.00 prison work was spent cleaning and grading streets. Work was done on North Second, Spruce, Greenwood, V Avenue, Island City road, N. Avenue and Eighth street. Meal tickets cost \$16.80.

The recorder collected \$20.00; \$1.00 for board of state prisoner; \$3.00 pound fees; \$22.50 on Sewer, Adams to Washington, with \$1.35 interest on same; \$17.00 dog tax and \$2.50 for five building permits. He drew \$57 warrant of labor certificates on street department. He issued a license for selling merchandise on treasurer's receipt for \$5.00. Also dance hall license on treasurer's receipt for \$5.00, and peddler's license on treasurer's receipt for \$7.50.

The treasurer received \$2,136.10 taxes from the county treasurer; \$179.54 improvement installments; \$22.50 improvement interest; \$121.56 water rent; \$1.50 for three electrical permits; \$50.00 for dance hall license,

and \$12.50 for one day's peddler's license. He paid \$101.25 contingent warrants; \$513.50 water warrants; \$57.00 road warrant and \$454.81 improvement district interest. No fines last week. Respectfully submitted, F. J. LAFKY.

BOAT FOR UMATILLANS

Special Provisions Made to Carry Visitors to Canal

Pendleton, March 25.—Umatilla county will have a special steambot to convey the delegation from this county to the celebration at Celilo, May 5 and the steamer will be the Undine or the George Burton, probably the former, with the capacity of 310 passengers.

Definite news to the effect a steamer has been chartered was announced last evening at Stanfield by H. N. Dryer of the celebration committee. A fare of \$2 for the trip from Umatilla to Celilo has been made and this expense will be sufficient to meet the incidental expenses necessary, such as fare for the band.

Tickets for the steamer trip are to be placed on sale in the various towns of the county at once and 100 tickets will be assigned to Pendleton. Inasmuch as the accommodations will be limited those desiring tickets will do well to engage them quickly. A more detailed announcement as to who will have the tickets in hand here will be made tomorrow. The O-W. R. & N. Co. will give a fare and a third rate to Umatilla and return. It is the plan for the local delegation to leave here by special Pullman train the evening of May 4. The Pullmans will be parked at Umatilla overnight. Early on the morning of May 5th the trip to Celilo will be taken up, the Umatilla county steamer joining with the steamers from points further up the river. The return from Celilo will be made by rail.

SPRINGS OWNERS CHANGE

Summer Resort in Mountains Under New Management Now

Pendleton March 25.—Bingham Springs, popular pleasure resort of Umatilla county, will this year be conducted under the management of W. F. Hoch and F. E. Van Dusen, both well known residents and business men of Pendleton. They signed a lease yesterday with the owners, Harman Rosenberg and John Luck, who purchased the property last fall.

The new lessees will begin work at once to improve the resort. The grounds will be cleaned, the pool and bath rooms fixed up and necessary repairs made to the hotel, annex and cabins. Though the institution will be able to accommodate small parties the formal opening for the season will of fishermen after the first of April, not be for several weeks or until all of the improvements are completed. Messrs. Hoch and Van Dusen and the owners of the springs returned yesterday from the resort and report the roads in remarkably good condition for travel. There is only one bad spot, they report, and that is disappearing as the mud dries out. Two gangs are now at work smoothing up the road above Gibbon and the new management will run an auto stage between this point and the springs. Mr. Van Dusen will leave soon to remain at the springs permanently and Mr. Hoch plans on spending much of his time there this summer.

WORK TRAIN CREW IS OUT

WORK CENTERS AROUND TRACK AT NELSON

Annual Excursion Plans Changed—Other O-W News

Yesterday afternoon a new train crew was put to work on the O-W to handle track repair work on the vicinity of Nelson and Durkee. The work gang is of considerable size and the crew will rip-rap the mainline for a considerable distance. This is one of the evidences of spring's arrival, and swells, incidentally, the company's payroll out of this point.

The O-W is again to use city water, the supply available being such that the company's taps can again be opened. For three months, or about that, the company depended solely on its artesian well, which has an air lift attachment to increase the flow and in addition the company has a four-inch pipe connected with the river. Temporarily at least, the water question will not be a source of worry to company officials. Should the year prove an arid one and the amount of water in both Beaver creek and the Grande Ronde be materially decreased new problems will arise in watering the rolling stock of the O-W. A year hence the water problem will no doubt be solved by the city and to meet conditions that might arise the coming summer is receiving attention of company officials now.

Instead of going to Minam, as was the order last year, the annual excursion and picnic which the O-W. Safety First association has in mind for June, will no doubt go to Gibbon. The camping and picnic facilities there are said to be immense, free from dust, level, shady, with good fishing nearby, and on the main line where visitors from Pendleton, Umatilla and Portland could attend with less inconvenience than they could on the branch. Committees are working out these problems even this early and within a few days definite decision will be reached by those in charge. It appears that the attendance will be about twice that of last year when fully 1200 people were present.

Business on the O-W continues to hold its own, with ups and downs that reach a general average about equal to last month, it in turn being some better than January.

Colorado Autoists on Eastern Tour.

Colorado Springs, Colo., March 25.—An automobile tour early next month starting from the foot of Pike's Peak and extending as far east as Indianapolis, is being prepared for today by Colorado motor enthusiasts. It will be a "Socialability tour." About 3,000 miles will be traversed. The eastern leg will be made over the Pike's Peak "ocean to ocean" highway in a straight line from the peak through Eastern Colorado, northern Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, and Indiana. From Pike's Peak to Indianapolis the trail is 1,200 miles. The return route has not been definitely decided upon. Manitou and Colorado Springs Chambers of Commerce are behind the tour.

Texas Children Learn Hog Raising

Dallas, Texas, Mar. 25.—Texas will do its share to save the country from a meat famine. Of 20,000 men, boys and girls who have entered the contests of the Texas Industrial Congress for farm products, 1,200 are in the hog club. As many more are listed in the various other branches of the live stock industry, but hogs are considered the likeliest money producers.

A circular to the hog club contestants, telling how to get the best results, says:

"Choose a young pig, one recently weaned, whose mother has received the right care, and which is not a runt, should be chosen. "If a hog is kept in a dry lot and fed corn only, he will lose the feeder money every time. If the hog is given all the skim milk he can drink, with an ear of corn each day, half an ear when he is small, he will grow fast and make the feeder money."

"The hog should be given a chance to keep himself clean. A scratching place with a gunny sack dipped in kerosene nailed on it will serve to rid him of dirt and most of the vermin, frequently. But be sure to get a good pig. Don't use a mongrel or a cross breed."

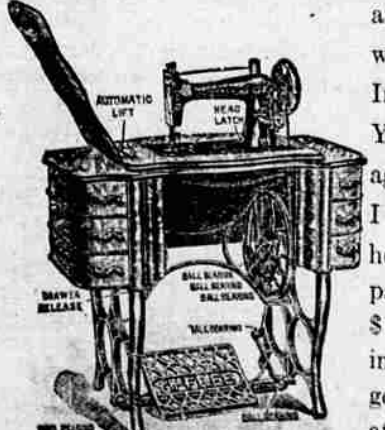
