## ELGIN RANCH DISPOSED OF

NEARLY TEN THOUSAND PURCHASE PRICE FOR HILL FARM

Other News of Interest from Elgin and Surrounding District

A deal was consummated this week whereby the Wm. Hill farm, situated five miles south of Elgin, was sold to F. E. Smith, well known business man and manager of the G. M. & S. Co., of this city.

The farm consists of 290 acres of farm and pasture land and one of the best all-purpose farms in the north end of the county. The purchase price was \$9,500.00. In the transaction Mr. Smith traded his two-story residence, formerly occupied by him as a home. The residence will be moved to the other farm owned by Mr. Hill, adjoining the corporate limits of Elgin on the South, and will make an ideal farm home.

The farm secured by Mr. Smith is one of the best of that section, the soil of that portion under cultivation being decidedly productive. Mr. Smith will perhaps lease the farm in the immediate future. He purchased the same purely from a speculative standpoint.

The deal was made through the agency of O. E. Ryder, well known Elgin real estate dealer.

### Return to Old Home

Mr. and Mrs. Terry Tuttle, two of the oldest living pioneers of Union county, who have been residing in Elgin for the past few years, were moved last Thursday to their old home on Willow creek, five miles south of here.

"Grandfather" and "Grandmother" Tuttle, as they are familiarly known, located on their Willow creek farm 52 years ago and upon their return to the old farm will spend their remaining days in the third house that has been constructed on the place.

Their first house was constructed of logs. The second was a frame structure, the interior decorating being executed by Hon. T. T. Geer, ex-Governor of Oregon. The third residence was erected a few years ago, and is a modern farm house. From the old log cabin and tallow-dip lights of the early sixties to a modern home, equipped with telephone and

electric lights is the experience of this aged couple.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Tuttle are more than 90 years of age, and their return to the old home, in this, their declining years, marks the last event of their long and historic career, for it is there, the place of their choice, they will spend their few remaining days—'tis but a brief time until both will cross the pearly undiscovered, to that home from whence none return.

### Ready to Turn Stock On Range

J. N. Chandler, Sommer Bros., A. H. Parsons and Galloway Bros. accompanied by a number of riders, left Tuesday morning for the south end of Grande Ronde valley where they have wintered several hundred head of cattle during the past winter. The cattle will be driven to Elgin, and from here will be distributed to various summer ranges.

Jointly the above named stockmen wintered 500 head in the valley, J. N. Chandler, Galloway Bros. and Sommer Bros. owing the larger portion. Already many of the stockmen of this section have turned their horses and cattle on the range. The forepart of this week a number of stockmen of the Flat drove their horses to the Minam and other owners are to follow during the next few days.

The mildness of the past winter and the early spring days has been a big boon to local stockmen in the saving of feed and has made it possible for them to turn their stock on the range at an early date.

F. F. Graham, a local stock owner, and son, Harlan, left Monday with a herd for the range, and if the present weather continues it will be only a few days until all stock will be on the range.
