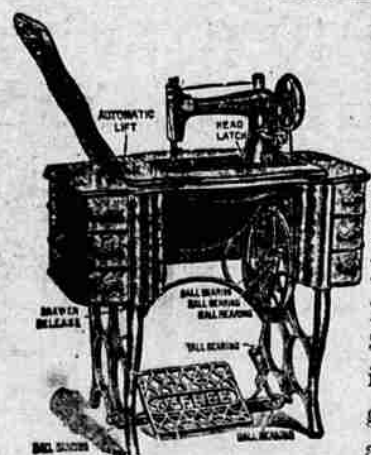

'pick it up and as it is deadly poison, serious damage may be done to any stock feeding upon it. If spread carefully in small flakes about plants that are attacked, good results may be obtained. Chickens should not be allowed to feed where this mash is used. For small quantities to be used in gardens, smaller amounts would be necessary and this formula may be used by simply cutting it down to proportion wanted.

The poison vegetable bait is sometimes used and this is done by spraying alfalfa or clover with arsenic of lead, treating with one pound to fifty gallons of water, then mow this close to the ground and spread over infested field in small heaps. This is best applied in the evening and it will remain green sufficiently long enough to be attractive to the worms.

Trap Lights.

Trap lights for capturing adult moths at night has not proved very successful in a practical way. The cost and trouble are considerable and as we capture about as many beneficial insects, as injurious ones we do not like to recommend this system. We found that most of the cut worms that are captured by trap lights are males or mostly females that have already laid their eggs.

Cultivation Methods.

Plowing in the fall or early spring is recommended and where some of the worms pass the winter in the pupae stage the practice is fatal, however this practice will only destroy a few of the half-grown worms or larvae, but it will destroy their food supply by cutting down the weeds in the infested field. This method will offer a good opportunity to use the Poison Bran Mash. The worm being hungry by having its food supply cut off will feed very readily upon the Poison Bran Mash and will thereby be killed before the crop is ready for them to injure. Frequent shallow cultivation during the growing season will encourage plant growth and destroy numbers of cutworms that happen to be in growing stages in the soil.

It is not best to rely upon the natural enemies to control this pest for in some seasons it becomes serious enough that we should resort to other means. From the reports of various infested areas it may be well to make special effort in this season to eliminate as many of this generation as is possible to do so. With this pest like many others best success will come through community cooperation.
