CONFESSION UPHOLDS VERDICT

Salem has now confessed to the murder of Walter T. Perry at Union in September 1910. He made his confession in a letter written to Nick Ficklin, 1250 Commercial street, father of Mrs. Perry.

Ellexson says he has been converted to religion. He asks their forgiveness. On purely circumstantial evidence Ellexson was convicted of murdering Perry and in December, 1910, was sentenced to the penitentiary for life. The case attracted a great deal of interest in eastern Oregon at the time as Perry, who was 33 years old was born and raised at Union and was popular. He was preparing to move to Portland. Mrs. Perry and their three children, the youngest of whom was four months old, had preceded him to that city.

Ellexson, according to the testimony had previously worked for Perry and been discharged. He went to Baker and when he heard Perry was staying alone in Union he went there and was asked to supper and to stay all night. As Perry was showing him up the stairs, Ellexson according to the evidence, shot him in the back, and after he fell shot him four more times. Ellexson then disappeared, and a few weeks later was arrested in Umatilla county.

His letter to Mr. Ficklin was written from the state penitentiary March 29. It says:

"Nick Ficklin. Dear Neighbor—The God of heaven has come to me through the inspiration of His holy spirit, and has converted me into a new man. I now find the opportunity to ask of you that which I have longed to do for some years or more. It is, Mr. Ficklin, that I am guilty of the crime that you prosecuted me for. And will say that I am very sorry for it, and I will ask you and each and every one that I have harmed in any way to forgive me for I repent and am sorry."

"I have a strong determination to comply with the conditions that God has laid down for a sinner to inherit an eternal home where there will be no sin."
