WOOLGROWERS IN MEETING

Important Questions Discussed at Baker Gathering.

Baker, April 3.—With several important matters vital to the life of the sheep industry featuring the discussions, the two sessions of the woolgrowers of Eastern Oregon and Southern Idaho, according to the majority of those present, accomplished the object of the meeting, in that better understanding and co-operation between the sheep men will follow the getting together on several grounds which were vital, owing to the present conditions of the industry.

R. N. Stanfield was unanimously chosen as the presiding officer of the session, while John G. Hoke, the secretary of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association, was given the same position. The morning session met at 10 o'clock, the council chamber of the city hall being well filled with a goodly representation of sheepmen from all adjacent points and many local people interested directly or indirectly in the wool business.

Among the speakers during the day were Montie B. Gwinn of Boise, who gave some time to the discussion of taxation on sheep, urging a movement for uniform valuation for assessment. He was followed by A. C. Ruper of Wasco county, one of the original organizers of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association, in 1886. J. W. Creath of the Portland Wool Warehouse association, spoke on the marketing features and mentioned the fact that one of the prominent members and stockholders of the association is Wm. Pollman of this city. G. W. E. Smith of Grant county in an interesting address, told of the manner of selling wool in England, where it is all auctioned by number, and in event of two bidders offering the same price, the auctioneer may choose the buyer.

The abolition of ten-car shipping rate on sheep was deplored by several speakers, and among the duties of the resolutions committee was that of presenting the rate question to the state railroad commission. President Fred Falconer of the Oregon Woolgrowers, Montie B. Gwinn, J. C. Creath, R. N. Stanfield and John G. Hoke were named as members of the committee.

One of the most important matters taken up was the question of more humane methods at shearing plants this subject being introduced by Chairman Stanfield, who said that the woolgrowers should take steps for more humane treatment of sheep, many being injured by careless shearers. He stated that the State Humane society would provide copies of the law regulating the shearing of sheep, tending to less rough treatment. Thousands of dollars are lost annually by sheepmen by the carelessness of shearers and their cruel handling of sheep. The method of throwing the sheep by one hand is strongly condemned, as it usually either severely strains the muscles or injures the joints.
