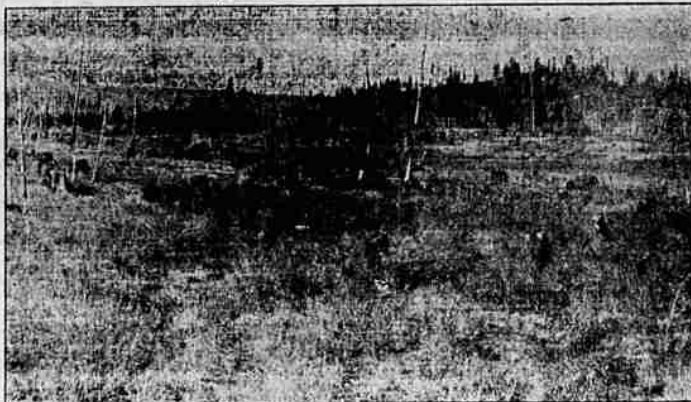

UNIFORM PRICE IS REACHED BY ALL.

Spuds Have Been a Burden, Merchants Generally Losing on Them.

Potatoes are uniformly sold at \$1.25 this week, retail. For some time there has been considerable irregularity among the merchants, but the situation is now such that the price is uniform at \$1.25. The potato market has been a peculiar one all winter, and practically every local merchant has lost more or less money on his potatoes for the winter.

Spinach is slightly cheaper, and a drop in rhubarb within a week is expected.
