LOCAL STORES HANDLE HOME VEGETABLES.

Two-Pound Roll of Butter Down to Sixty-five Cents.

Home-grown onions have reached the retail market and practically all the onions sold came from La Grande gardens. Onions and rhubarb, however, are about the only vegetables that are ready for the trade at the present time. Two-pound roll of butter has dropped to 65 cents, and Oregon-grown asparagus has reached a 15-cent level.

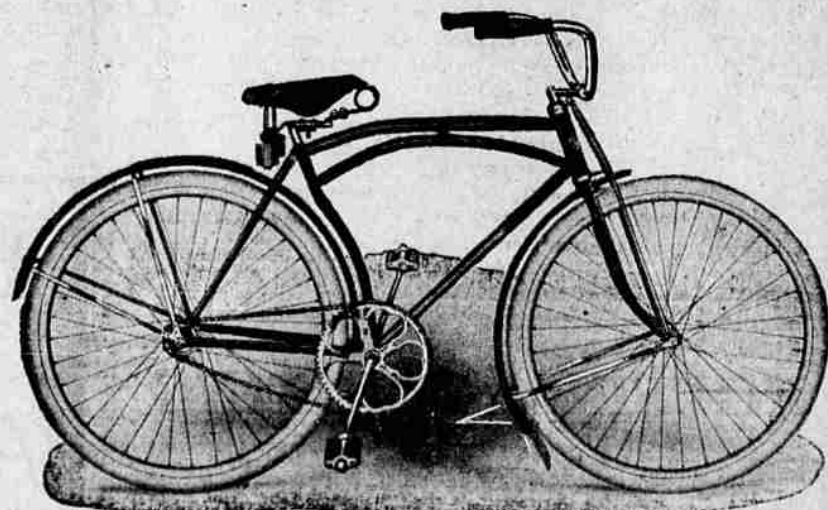
