are hereby granted power to enact and amend their municipal charters

subject to the constitution and criminal laws of the State of Oregon." Section 12 of Chapter 226, Laws of 1907, which was an act to provide for carrying into effect the above constitutional provision contains this provision, "Amendments to any city charter may be proposed and submitted to the people by the city council with or without any initiative petition, but the same shall be filed with the city clerk for submission not less than sixty days before the election, at which they are to be voted upon, and no amendment of a city charter shall be effective until it is approved by majority of the votes cast thereon by the people of the city or town to which it applies." These above provisions of the organic law and the act of the legislature clearly indicate that the legal voters of a city must enact or amend their charters, and not the council or the commissioners. In the case of State vs Dallas City, 143 Pac 1127, Judge Burnett in writing the opinion of the court, says,—"We are also of the opinion when the people of a city have amended their charter by the use of the word "ordained" this circumstance alone does not empower the council to repeal the amendment, as it would be a mere ordinance enacted by itself, or the people for the authority to enact or amend the charter of any city is vested in its legal voters by Section 2 of Article 1 of the state constitution. While some expressions in the case of Harris vs. Forest Grove, 54 Oregon 443, considered by themselves might lead the reader of the opinion to believe that a charter could be amended or enacted by a city council or commissioners without being submitted to the legal voters, yet as a matter of fact the charter of the City of Forest Grove was adopted by a vote of the legal voters of said city. I do not believe, however, that the invalidity of the charters of 1914 will effect these proceedings reviewed, because the commissioners followed the charter of 1909 in making the improvement, as they were required to do under the provisions of the charter of 1913. These proceedings having been commenced before the adoption of the charter of 1913. It is claimed however that the charter of 1909 and 1913, are both abortive and invalid, and that our former commissioner form of government "should be relegated to desuetude" for the reason that under the constitutional amendment above quoted, Section 2 Article 11, the legal voters have power to enact and amend charters, but not to repeal them, and that the attempt to repeal the charter of 1885 by the enactment of the charter of 1909 was ineffective, and that said charter of 1885 is still in full force and effect, and as the proceedings for the improvement of fourth Street are not authorized by said charter of 1885, said proceedings are void. Certainly the power to enact a charter would include implied authority to repeal a former charter. In the case of Branch vs. Alby, 142 Pac. 598, the supreme court of this state says; "The conclusion seems to be irresistible that the people by the adoption of said amendment intended to withdraw from the legislative assembly all power that it previously possessed to enact, amend or repeal charters, or acts incorporating cities and to confer upon the legal voters of cities and towns all said powers except the right to repeal." I think the learned judge who wrote the opinion in that case, did not mean to hold that the legal voters of a city had no right to enact an entirely new charter, and thereby repeal a former charter, either directly or by implication, but that the legal voters could not repeal a charter so as to leave a city without any charter, or commit "Municipal suicide," as Judge Burnett expresses in McKee vs. City of Portland, 61 Oregon 385.

Believing as I do that there is no objection to the proceedings that can be taken advantage of by means of a writ of review, the writ will be dismissed, and the defendants will recover from the plaintiffs their costs and disbursements in this proceeding.
