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A STORY OF THE RIGHT KIND OF A FATHER

In the May Woman's Home Companion appears an article about fathers in which is told the story of two fathers—one a successful father in his relations to his children, and the other a failure. Following is a part of the story of the successful father: "The father who has kept his son was wise enough to remember that there was no sorrows in the world so bitter as the disappointments of childhood. For instance, the boy will never forget his father's tender solicitude on the morning when they got up to find the cat had eaten his pigeon. He had mowed lawns and weeded gardens all summer with no word of complaint, because the money that he earned was to purchase the finest pair of fancy pigeons in town. In the evenings, after the day's hard work, he built the pigeons' home and fashioned the yard of wire around it. One evening when the summer was nearly over he trudged up town with the earnings of all his work in his pocket, and came back with the two beautiful birds. He watched them in their little house until long past his usual bedtime, and then went unwillingly to bed. That night the cat found a place where the wire around the yard was not secure, and killed one of the birds.

Some fathers might have passed it off with a laugh and an offer to replace the lost bird; and such fathers would have wondered in later years a trifle resentfully, why their sons went always to their mother for comfort and for advice in their problems. He was wise enough, too, to know one boy a trifle strange, which sets him apart a little from the other boys is the germ of personality that is most precious. When his boy dived back a little from sports and showed an eagerness to be alone and to read, he, who himself had been roughest of the crowd of the games of his own youth, made no effort to create his son's boyhood in the image of his own."
