BOWLERS FROM WALLA WALLA TO BOISE DUE

Big Event in Bowling Affairs Discussed for Middle of May

In May La Grande will be mecca of leading bowlers between Walla Walla and Boise if plans do not go astray. A plan is afoot now to have Walla Walla, Pendleton and Boise bowlers attend a tourney in this city, and the matter of equitable entertainment will be taken up by the bowling fraternity with the commercial club. It is not certain that Walla Walla can come, but it is felt sure that Pendleton and Boise will have bowlers in attendance. These will be return matches for both Pendleton and Walla Walla.

If the event is put on, the date will be sometime in the middle of May. Speed Humphrey, manager of ceremonies at The Club alleys, said on his return from Boise that a return match with that city will be held here about the middle of May and that Pendleton and Walla Walla will be invited to be present on that occasion. Something in the way of a banquet for the visitors either before or after the tourney will be arranged for the visitors, and the meet will no doubt be a success.
