

STUDENTS WILL HAVE A COACH

EXCLUSIVE DUTIES OUTLINED BY BOARD.

La Grande Athlete to Have Complete Charge of Sports.

The athletic department of the La Grande high school has been re-organized with the appointment of a director of athletics who will do all coaching and managing and will be responsible for all work along athletic lines, particularly football, basketball and track. Charles Reynolds has been selected to do the work.

The athletic board which consists of one member of the school board, two members of the faculty and the student managers will continue its work, the only change in the personnel being made is the addition of the new director, who will submit all plans, schedules and expenditures for the sanction of this body.

The first work of any importance will be the engineering of the 16th annual Eastern Oregon track and field meet, which is to be held in La Grande on Saturday, May 8. Twenty-four schools will enter this meet and 125 athletes will compete, and the plans are to make this the largest and best meet of its kind ever held in Eastern Oregon. Pendleton and Baker are arranging for special trains to accommodate the rooters and small crowds from each of the other towns are expected to attend.

Silver loving cups are to be given to the winners of the first places in all events, silver medals to the winners of second places and bronze to the third place. The presentation of cups has been made possible only by the generosity of the merchants and business men of La Grande, who have consented to give these awards.

In hopes that the big loving cup, which is to be presented to the winners of the Eastern Oregon track meet by the O. A. C., may be won by the local track team every athlete available is training faithfully under the direction of the director.

The annual class meet will be held next Saturday at the fair grounds, the Union County meet at Union on April 24, the Eastern Oregon meet here the 8th of May and the University of Oregon interscholastic meet at Eugene on the 15th of May. If the dope works right, the blue and white runners will figure prominently in all of these meets.

Qualifications Many.
The new coach has had splendid training for the part. It is his duty to deal with young boys, medium or undersized of stature and while he developed into one of the best collegiate quarterbacks in the northwest when he was in football togs, he fell back upon brains and ability rather than brute strength to do so, and just this point will stand him in good stead now for he is dealing with anything but giants. Collegiate stars who break through a football line with sheer strength, seldom make suitable coaches for they have never been compelled to develop brains and "noodle" along with their muscular development.

The remuneration to the coach is comparatively small, for he gives but a few hours a day to the work and the school board firmly believes that centralization of responsibility upon one man with experience in directing the monetary end of the work, will reimburse the school treasury for the small outlay for a coach. All small schools have trouble making ends meet for athletics and student body affairs, but it is believed that one manager working in conjunction with the student body council, will "businessize" and systematize the financial end of the student body activities. The experiment has been found profitable in other states, but La Grande is one of the first to try it out in Oregon.

The county road will be graded and rolled the entire seven miles of the course and estimates of the cost of building concrete culverts over the several streams which are all badly in need of new bridges, have been made. These bids have to await the sanction of the county court but this is expected at an early date, so that work on the culverts will not be delayed.

As the culverts are permanent fixtures for the county road, the Motorcycle club could not be expected to furnish them, but in order to help defray the expenses the club is to furnish the gravel and part of the labor.

"Mister Squeegie," the quaint figure used in Diamond Tire advertising, has joined the ranks of the equal suffragists.

Mrs. Anne Davis Chisholm is vice chairman of the Equal Suffrage Association of Huntington, Pa. Recently Mrs. Chisholm clipped from a Huntington newspaper advertisement, a picture of Mister Squeegie, which was pasted upon a piece of yellow paper—yellow being the equal suffrage color—and beside it the lady wrote this declaration of principles:

"Let 'em vote.
"I've got my umbrella, so it can't hurt me.

"If they help make—
"Better Roads,
"Better Schools,
"Better Laws,
"Better Food,
"Better Homes—
"Let 'em vote.
"It may help me."

The picture and Mrs. Chisholm's comment attracted a great deal of attention, and are reported to have caused a number of Huntington men who formerly opposed equal suffrage to decide that "there may be something in it, after all."

When the Diamond Tire officials at Akron, heard of Mrs. Chisholm's clever plan to bring the men over to her support, they decided to furnish her with a big poster, showing "Mister Squeegie" seated upon a Diamond Tire, with his umbrella hoisted. She was given authority to "work him for all he was worth" in the service of the cause that is dear to her heart.
