Interesting News Items from Eighteen Years Ago

(Culled from Observer Files.) Tuesday, December 14, 1897.—The Populist party has sent out its call for the state convention and there will be no county conventions until after the state gathering. It is plain that Union party is largely self-appointed leaders intending to disrupt the party. Sheriff Phy is in Pendleton on business today.

Engineer Rhunky has gone to Kamela to take charge of a helper engine at that place.

Miss Ella Alder has finished her school at Moss Chapel. The patrons of the school speak of her in the highest terms.

Mr. and Mrs. Matt Mitchell drove over from Cove, complaining about the wind, but finding it better than muddy roads.

Cayuses on the range in Morrow county are selling for \$1.00 per head. Two horses attached to the front wheels of a buggy came dashing into town last night. Some time later, S. O. Swackhamer and Sam Purcell of Union, mud bespattered, came walking into town.

The Old Town Literary society had a very interesting meeting last night. Among those taking part were Lou Wenham, Maude Moon, Ralph Worsell, Lee Wenham, Carrie Huff, Clay Rinehart, and others.

Chauncey Bailey, a tie cutter near Meacham, was banking ties Saturday and was so unfortunate as to get a gash from an ax that came near costing him his life. The gash was four inches deep.

Wednesday, Dec. 15, 1897.—Yesterday we stated that Hardy Harold had been injured. Doctor Molitor states that the facts are Mr. Harold was riding on an empty hayrack in Monday's strong wind when the rack was hurled from the wagon. He suffered a fractured collar bone and severe internal injuries.

Last night about 7 o'clock, a man resembling a farmer walked into the A. B. Cherry cigar store on Depot street and asked for a plug of tobacco. In payment he handed Mr. Cherry a \$10 bill. Mr. Cherry has worked in a bank and his experience enabled him to learn at a glance that the bill was counterfeit. The man was questioned and later arrested, confessing the bill was bogus. He said he had sent east for the green goods. Tomorrow he will tell his story to Justice Van Buren.
