SOCIETY NEWS.

Few more pleasant events have been held in Union county than the Elks' drama, "In the Bishop's Carriage," presented to an Elgin audience Thursday evening. As is the usual custom of Elksdom, when visiting outside towns, there was no business feature, but on the other hand it was a social outing—an opportunity for La Grande Elks to visit the Elgin people.

And by no means was this a one-sided matter, for Elgin was delighted to have the Elks' special with its passengers, which was plainly evidenced in the way the band of that city greeted the train's arrival.

When the curtain rose on the first act the handsome municipal theatre was filled with an audience that did not lack appreciation of the actors' efforts. With combined band and orchestra Leader Bader rendered selection after selection of classy, high grade music to the delight of the entire audience. It is but right to say that Elgin's musical organizations are superb and of the quality seldom to cities.

"In the Bishop's Carriage" was played much better at Elgin than it was given in La Grande. Every member of the cast showed improvement. There was an ease among the cast that took away all appearance of amateurs and a stranger would have guessed that a company of old veterans in the legitimate drama was at work.

Mr. and Mrs. DeVere once more showed their superior talents. Each has a splendid conception of the part taken, and Mrs. DeVere won the audience to her from her first appearance never letting go of the firm hold until her final bow in the last act. Ed. Coolidge was the juvenile favorite and increased his well deserved popularity at the Elgin event, while Charles Harding took off what few he found outside of the metropolitan professional yegman and safe-cracker, Mr. DeVere made abundantly good. Old Man Hilary never lost favor with the audience, but on the other hand the handsome compliments that were hurled at him from orchestra circle to balcony might have turned the head of a less balanced man than Adna Rogers. Pauline Lederle, as Mrs. Hilary, and Vera Joel, as the daughter in love with Jammison (Coolidge) each carried their parts to highest praise. While Mrs. C. P. Ferrin, William Pearce, H. E. Dixon Frank Bay and Tom Williamson were not frequently on the stage, each performed the part well.

As a special number of the evening the old Union county favorite, C. P. Ferrin, sang in his rich high tenor voice songs that touched the hearts of all present. That the audience was delighted plainly showed in the heavy applause and the repeated pretty compliments to the singer.

After the play Elgin people acted as hosts to the La Grande crowd and a social ball was given in the Elgin Rex hall. Here again did Director Bader and his orchestra provide excellent music and for two hours one of those good, old-fashioned dances followed, where neighbor meets neighbor amid surroundings of excellent music, good fellowship and neighborly affection.

The Elks' lodge of La Grande is certainly spreading the gospel of true fraternity by fathering such events as the one of last Thursday evening.
