## APPLE SCAB WAR OPENED

PRESENT TIME MOST SUITED FOR SPRAYING

County Agriculturist Outlines Course to Pursue to Kill Scab.

The fungus disease known as apple scab is gradually gaining a foothold in Union county. Steps may be taken to prevent its spreading and control the same where it has made its appearance. Apple scab is recognized as the most serious fungus disease of apple in our western states. It exacts a toll in almost every orchard district, that is enormous when considered in the aggregate. Its spread is slow and sure, and it is well if fruit growers wish to prevent this disease, to take steps early in the season that will hold it in check.

This being a fungus disease which winters on the leaves and possibly in small twigs and begins its growth about the time the fruit trees begin their growth in the spring. Once it infects our apples it is difficult to control it. The idea of dealing with this condition is to prevent the germination of the spores in the early spring and keep the apple coated with spray, it will prevent further germination later in the season. Many growers attempt to control this disease too late in the season and only have part or no success, due to the fact that the fungus is already within the tissues of the apple and nothing can be done to prevent its growth. While it is easy to prevent the germination of the spores if the work is done in time.

The apples most seriously affected are such varieties as the New-Town, Black Twigs, and Bellflower, etc., but many others are more or less subject to this disease. I would especially recommend to growers of New-Town variety that they follow the instructions given below. If any others of the different varieties are known to be affected, it would be well to spray them also according to the following:

First application when the blossom buds show pink just before the buds separate into clusters, with most varieties that will be affected with scab will be within the next week. For second application use lime and sulphur Standard Beaume test 30 degrees diluted 1-25 or 30 with water, that is one part lime sulphur to 25 or 30 parts water.

Use high pressure spray and coat all parts of the tree. Second spray would come with the first codling moth spray, which is just when the petals are falling. For second application use lime sulphur 30 degree test, diluted 1-30, add two pounds neutral arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of this solution. About two weeks after this second application a third is generally applied, using the same

formula as the second. It is very important that this first application be made if good success is to be obtained in the prevention of this disease. As stated above, fungus spores that have entered the tissue are very hard to control.

#### NEW BAKERY PROPOSED

Scientific Oven Built in the Foley Hotel Building

One of the most modern bakeries ever installed in Eastern Oregon will be opened in La Grande on May 1st by Mr. Moon, who owns the Moon Bakery at 1408½ Adams. J. E. Foley, owner of the Foley hotel building, has just completed the erection of a scientific oven that has a large capacity and is located in the rear of their oom adjacent the La Grande Investment Co. offices. The new oven is built from the ground to the floor level in solid concrete. Added to this is the brick oven structure which carries three feet of sand below and three feet above to hold an even heat. Selected brick form the top arch and these are bound together with cement mortar. Re-enforcement of steel extends both ways of the oven making it one of the best built structures of its kind possible to have. Contractor G. H. Rush did the work.

The room for the bakery goods will be arranged to suit Mr. Moon and he will open for business in a first class location with a physical plant that cannot be excelled any place in the northwest.
