COMMISSION IN SESSION

ROUTINE BUSINESS GONE OVER LAST EVENING

More Beaver Creek Pipe Line Funds to Be Invested in Bonds

With all commissioners present, the city commission last night took up the routine duties before its mid-week session.

The commission first heard reports from its officers for the past month; then it took up the matter of converting the old Elk's lodge home into an amusement hall and the lodge will be advised as to what changes will be necessary in the present exit plans, general arrangement etc., that should the building be converted to that purpose, it may conform with the requirements of the ordinance covering such establishments.

The city treasurer was instructed to invest \$2000 from the Beaver Creek sinking fund into bond purchases as an investment.

Efforts to correct a double assessment on a piece of property owned by Mrs. F. Honan in Improvement District No. 4-B, were initiated.

General manager's report for the week ending April 17th, 1915.

There was one fire last week on Cove Avenue caused by the bursting of a bottle of alcohol on a shelf above the

kitchen stove. Some loss, no insurance. The street superintendent spent \$166.15 in repairing Fir and North Second street macadam. He bought 23 yds. of rock for \$25.30 and paid \$50 for repairs. These two streets were scraped, smoothed and sanded and sprinkled. Then the grader was run over them to level up and shove soil and sand onto the rock. Then the street was rolled. We will have to put a little more rock and considerable more sand on these streets. The sand will make the road less sticky when wet. A heavy root of sand placed on these streets next fall should keep them in better shape. Y and the North end of Fir were built with sand instead of rock screenings. These parts are holding much better; but they have not seen as much service as the other streets named.

The Police arrested 11. Four drunk; 4 disorderly and 3 traffic violators. Served ten meals had 6 sleepers; one light out and collected \$25.00 fines last week.

The recorder received \$25.00 fines; \$4.42 sidewalk Dist. No. 24, with \$1.08 interest on same; \$1.50 for 3 building permits and \$4.00 dog tax. He issued one truck license on treasurer's receipt. Drew warrants for \$1865.54 this month's bills allowed by commission.

Last week the treasurer received \$19,164.82 taxes from the county County Treasurer; \$1165.91 water ret \$39.75 Imp. Dist. Interest; \$87.00 Imp. Dist. installments. \$2.50 for 5 electrical permits and \$5.00 for one truck license, and \$12.50 General Warrants and \$607.69 interest collected on Sewer 2 Section No. 3.

He paid \$49.78 road warrants, with \$1.19 interest on one. Also paid \$6284.28 General Warrants and \$607.69 interest on same. On April 10th the treasurer called all General Fund Warrants endorsed to August 1, 1913. On April 16th, he called them to Nov. 1st, 1913. There were 29 shut-offs on the 1st of April for being delinquent on the water rent.

The engineer and the water superintendent are at the intake this week surveying. Their report will be made next week.

CEILO PLANS ARE EXTENSIVE

Portland, Oregon, April 21.—(Special) Details of the great series of celebrations during the week of May 3-8 in commemorating the opening of The Dalles-Celilo Canal and the transfer of the Willamette locks to the U. S. Government for free operation, are practically complete.

The committees of arrangements at various points have prepared programs of peculiar interest, and the indications are that the attendance outclass anything of a celebration character ever seen in the northwest. In addition to the local attendance at each point there will be large delegations of visitors from all sections of the United States and from various points of the Columbia basin and the northwest. In the ranks of the visitors will be official representatives of the Congress of the United States, representatives of the army and navy, United States Senators and Congressmen, the governors of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, representatives of commercial bodies including the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, mayors of cities and many people of note in the business and railway world.

Portland and Astoria will participate by sending special steamers, the former to Lewiston and return and the latter to Big Eddy. The Dalles and return. While Salmon, Washington will send special boat to Big Eddy. The Dalles and return, and the people of Umatilla County will send a special boat from Umatilla to Big Eddy, and The Dalles, Lewiston, Pasco, Kennewick, Walla Walla and their neighboring cities will participate with steamboats making the trip from Lewiston down, while special train service will bear many thousands of

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people from Spokane and Inland Empire points, Seattle, Tacoma, Portland, Pendleton and the cities of the Willamette Valley to participate at various celebration centers. Arlington, Oregon will celebrate on May 4th and 5th.

Altogether, the movements to and fro will be unique in the history of river and rail transportation in the northwest, and the direction of trains and fleets is taxing the ingenuity of railway and steamboat men alike. Details are being carefully worked out however, and assurance is given the public that their needs will be met fully.

Men of prominence will be heard in

addresses at all points. Bands galore and entertainment features will be given that will make the week one of rare enjoyment. Nor will the cold business aspects of the occasion be overlooked; for recognition will be given to good roads construction and the necessity of wharves to meet the requirements of the open river. As Maryhill and Goldendale, Wash., highway enthusiasts will gather, and a careful study will be made of the most modern types of road construction. Opportunity will be given the congressional delegation and other experts to study the rivers at close range with a view to their future development. A special delegation of engineers will make the trip to the Celilo Canal to inspect the character of construction, with a view to compiling a report to be published in engineering journals.

The opening of the Willamette locks, the forenoon of May 6th will be

under the auspices of the Oregon City Commercial Club, assisted by delegations from the Willamette Valley. Portland will give a great celebration in the afternoon and evening of May 6th, while Astoria will entertain the Columbia and Snake River Waterways Association, May 7th and 8th. Vancouver, Wash., will celebrate during the forenoon of May 6th, and Kalama, Wash., the forenoon of May 7th.
