YOUR CHILDREN WON'T HAVE GOOD MANNERS IF YOU YOURSELF HAVEN'T

In the course of a very interesting little article, "Your Children's Manners," in the May Woman's Home Companion appears the following wise comment:

"Good company manners depend upon good home manners. As for table manners, the active child who from his earliest years has been accustomed to regular meals of simple food with sufficient variety for his health and pleasure will be hungry enough at mealtime to eat anything that is put before him.

"The place for a parent to begin training the manners of her child is with her own manners. Whenever a mother complains to me of the bad manners of her child she is unconsciously lodging a complaint against herself as a mother.

Of course a certain amount of boisterousness and willfulness is to be expected, and hoped for, in the child; but bad manners spring almost invariably from the carelessness, lack of consideration, artificial ideals, lack of time—many busy mothers, it is true, cannot give the time they wish to their children—of those who are responsible for the child's training.

"The old idea of training in behavior was based largely upon the principle of the child's consideration for its elders; the modern principle demands also the elders' consideration for the child."

Negro Attacks Pendletonian

Pendleton, Apr. 22.—Attacking Charles Bergman yesterday afternoon with a hoe, Joe Wood, a hobo negro, inflicted a bad wound upon the latter's elbow, injuring him painfully and perhaps permanently. Returning later in the day to renew the quarrel, the negro was met with a volley of shots from an automatic revolver but it is not believed any took effect. Bergman, who is a white man, was employed at the home of Al Richardson, colored, on west Court street to build a chimney. Wood was hoeing in the Richardson garden for a meal when it is said, Bergman approached him and asked his assistance in some task. The negro not only refused, it is said, but struck a vicious blow at the white man's head. Bergman dodged and threw up his arm, the sharp blade of the hoe striking his elbow, cutting an ugly wound and chipped off part of the bone.

The assailant made his escape and the officers could find no trace of him when they were called to the scene. Later, he returned to the Richardson home where Bergman was staying. Bergman grabbed an automatic revolver and fired seven times at him but does not think any of the bullets took effect.

The officers have made a thorough search for the colored man who is described as a man between 35 or 40 years old and roughly dressed.

Horse and Mule Raisers to Organize

Pendleton, April 22.—With a view to holding a horse and mule show in Pendleton some time this fall, an organization of Umatilla county horse and mule raisers is to be formed in the immediate future. A call meeting is to be held in the Commercial club rooms at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of May 1, at which time steps will be taken to band together breeders into a county organization which will become a subordinate part of the state association of horse and mule raisers.

Lincoln, Neb. Apr. 23.—The Western League opened today. Inaugural games in the eight-club circuit were promised big attendance. The Denver 1914 champions played here, Omaha at St. Joseph, Des Moines at Sioux City, and Topeka at Wichita. The only weak spot in the league was at Wichita, threatened with loss of its franchise. Denver has lost several of its former stars. Sioux City and St. Joseph were regarded as strong teams.
