New York, Apr. 23.—Bargain baseball prices are not beyond the realm of fan's hopes this season, according to well defined rumors floating around big leagues baseball quarters here. There has even been talk of a cut price war, if the Feds and O. B. don't make peace before the Fourth of July.

Even now all kinds of "contests," and schemes, some verging on the pales of the lottery law, are running in various cities to distribute baseball tickets and fill the grandstands and bleachers.

Except in the biggest league cities the half dollar rate is about the limit. Organized baseball has been steadily adopting a policy of gradually boosting prices, by extra fees for choice box and grandstand seats and cutting down sizes of the two-bit bleachers, in some cities. The Feds, on the other hand, have popularized fifty-cent ball.

The recent trend of late years toward higher admission prices now seem to have come to a dead halt—just in time to prevent an uproar all over the country from fans. In some of the bush leagues, 25 cents promises to be a prevailing rate, with even the 50 cent choice seats thrown into the two-bit class. Despite the magnates' yells of higher expenses, fancy salaries etc. the trench today seems to be toward a lower admission scale certainly no higher.
