"THREE WEEKS" TO COME

Story of Love That Eight Million Have
Read, in Photoplay

ing and tragic denouement of the ro-
mance of the pair is shown in all its
absolute king, the mad revels in the
palace, the plots and counterplots of
the cabal of royal counselors to de-
throned the queen are all graphically
indicated.

Miss Madaine Traverse, who ap-
pears in the role of the tempera-
mental queen, is regarded as one of
the most attractive of the country's
younger stars. Mr. Mahlon Hamil-
ton, who plays the role of Paul, is one
of the most popular of leading players
of the native stage.
