NEW RULES TO GOVERN MEET

FOUR-YEAR LIMIT AMONG REQUIREMENTS

Absolute Ban on More Than 21-Year Old Students Included

Eastern Oregon's interscholastic, to be conducted in La Grande May 8th will be operated under the rules governing and drafted by the Oregon High School Athletic association. Practically all the schools of Eastern Oregon have paid their dollar entrance fee and subscribed to the canons of the order. Principally, these refer to the age limit of 21, which La Grande has striven for during a period of years, and the four-year playing clause. The 21-year rule is specific and diametrically opposed to old men in boys' teams. The four year rule is less clear, but official interpretations have been placed upon it. Verbatim, the rule says:

"Bona fide students of secondary schools under 21 years of age, enrolled not later than October 15 for the first semester and February 15 for the second semester, and who are undergraduates, of the school, and playing not more than their fourth season in that sport, shall be eligible."

The rule, it is seen does not differentiate between grade schools and high schools, and Athletic Director Reynolds opened inquiries concerning Glen Conkey who was on the high school team while in the grades. An official ruling for the entire state has not been promulgated but President Churchill, the state superintendent, has unofficially held that students are not to consider high school athletics done while they are in the grades. J. F. Elton of Baker, who considers all question of disputes in Eastern Oregon has declared Conkey eligible, and is likely that the ruling will go forth from the board of control that the four years refers to high school and does not count grade endeavors with high school teams.

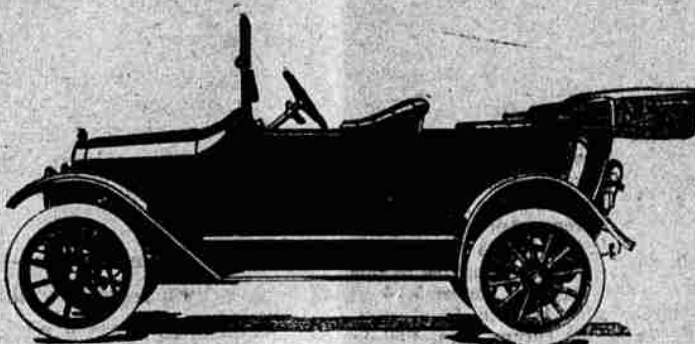

AUTO TOUR TO MINES ONE OF PLEASURE

Auto Truck Ramifies Possibilities of Suburban Stores

Joe Ebersole, a local hotel clerk, is converted to the fishing and motoring facilities that a trip to Cornucopia affords. He found this week that the trip could easily be made in one day with stops at Baker and Richland, and the fishing is top notch he says. Hunting is par excellence.

The possibilities of the auto truck for delivery purposes is seen in the fact that Clyde Kiddle of Island City has ramified the scope of his mercantile business for several miles, making deliveries as far as La Grande with his new Ford delivery car.

Speaking, apparently knowingly, up on the cross-country highway which La Grande, Pendleton and Baker have sought to swing this way, the Huntington News says:

The commissioners of the Weiser Valley highway district have decided upon the route of the Idaho-Pacific highway, says the Signal. The road will follow the south side of the railroad from Weiser to Jonathen, and from there a road will be built one mile directly north and the road will continue on to Porter's ferry. On this road of about eight miles there will be \$5000 appropriated by the district and one half that amount more by the state in putting it in shape for the National highway.

From the Baber county line, Malheur county and the state will shape

the road to Porter's ferry. Huntington is on the direct route of the National highway thoroughfare.

That there is decidedly better business feeling is shown by the marked increase in buying orders for automobiles. From the first of January to the middle of February business did not show very much increase over the same period a year ago. But since the middle of February business has shown a marked tendency to bloom. Orders at some factories since that date are 90 percent ahead of same period last year, and that the tide is still rising is shown by the fact that during the past three weeks the increase is 196 percent.

What is believed to be a record for quick filling of automobile orders occurred this week. R. W. Leighton, the Maxwell agent, ordered a carload of Maxwells by telephone Thursday morning at 9 o'clock, and today they are on the track here. The one who bought the machines will have them for their Sunday pleasure tours.

Dr. O. E. Silverthorn has joined the Ford brigade, and has equipped his new machine with a self-starter.

TOURNEY TAKING SHAPE

Union has Invited La Grande fans to Union During the Stock Show

Invitations have been received by tennis clubs of this city to send representatives to Union for a county tournament during the stock show early in June. In the invitations, Union's players point to the fact they are anxious to have La Grande stage an Eastern Oregon tournament later on when the cement courts are ready, but in the meantime Union wants to begin tennis "hostilities" with a county tournament there. Although Union last year didn't take the county tourney, individually or by team, her premier racket manipulator was not entered, and the sharks who go to Union for this tourney, will find hard skidding when they go up against the Union delegation this year. The Wilson boys and the other Imbler players are going in fine form and will participate in the tourney during the stock show. It is likely that the function will be extended over a period of two days.
