Glen Oliver will no doubt be a permanent fixture at second. Although he mused up a couple of line

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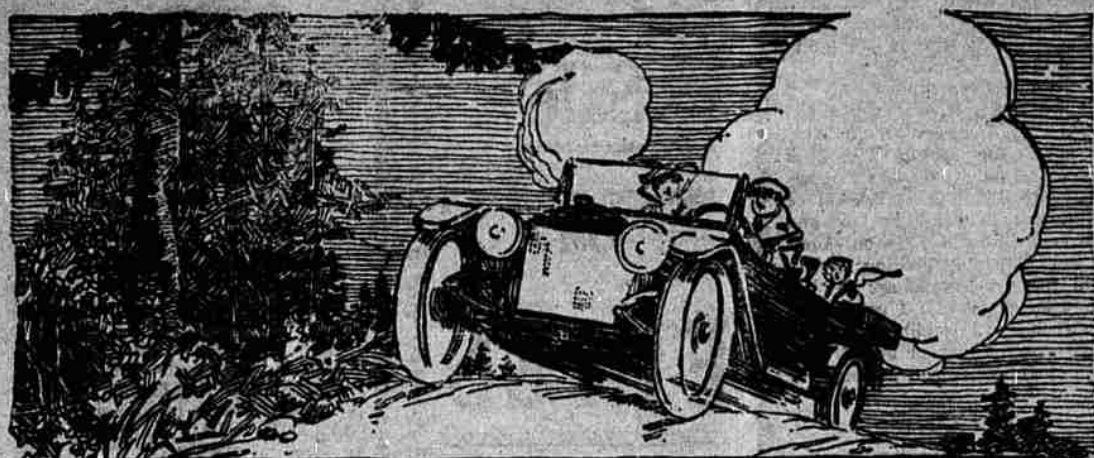
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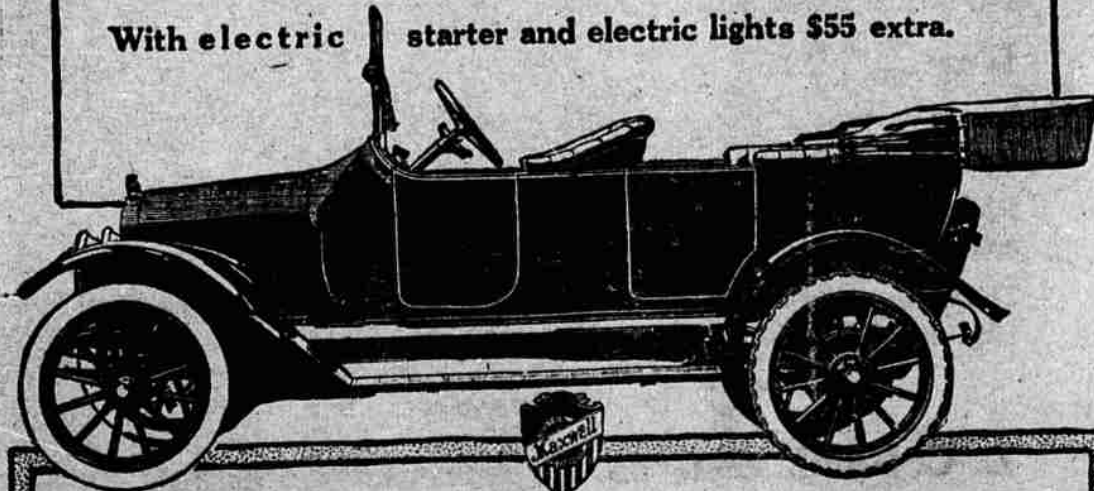
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ELGIN SMOTHERED
