marking the highway across the county. They asked that Union county take up the same kind of a sign and mark the Oregon trail to the county line. This met with hearty favor from La Grande people present. County Judge Phy was asked what could be done toward putting the mountain road leading from La Grande to Meacham in condition and he replied that, according to the county budget there would be about \$25 per mile to expend on this piece of the highway, and every dollar of that money would be used to the best possible advantage. As for spending more than that amount he refused to state, but said that in his opinion the road would be greatly improved over its present condition after the regular appropriation had been used.

Just what kind of a sign will be used for marking the highway was not determined, but Pendleton people agreed to consult La Grande and Baker and determine a sign that would be agreeable to all.

To further the good roads cause President Snodgrass appointed Dr. M. K. Hall, Al Andrews, Bird Lewis, Fred Curry and himself as a delegation to accompany the Pendleton representative to Baker. The two parties left about 10:30 o'clock for a meeting at Baker this afternoon, expecting to return to La Grande this evening for dinner.

Printing Point Does Not
Bob Up and Down
