NEW TROUBLES
FACE LEAGUEINTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION
IN TROUBLERaids by Other Leagues, Depression,
etc. Make Grief

New York, Apr. 27.—Harassed by Federal League raids and competition and also the European war, the success of the International League, making its debut today, will be closely watched by the moneyed interests of baseball as well as the fans.

The International presents a peculiar baseball situation. It is the only O. G. League which has peculiarly suffered from the war, because of its Canadian membership. The war caused Canadians to lose interest in baseball. The season there last year was a financial failure.

Transfer of the Baltimore franchise to Richmond, Va., forced by the Feds popularity in Oyster town, which run out Manager Jack Dunn's team—and with Dunn himself a native Baltimorean—caused today's opener to have special interest. New owners for the Newark Internationals, which for the first time has Federal opposition this year, was another interesting feature of today's International inaugural.

An unusual bunch of amateur fistic talent will touch here tonight in the New York state championship tournament at the City Athletic club. The boxing revival here has developed a number of new and good local fighters. Eddie Black, a 100-pounder, is said to be especially promising. Most of the regularly licensed clubs where boxing instructions is given a string of embryo fighters entered tonight.

drinking water innovation this season

at Washington's Florida avenue

park is a howling success, according

to all reports reaching here. Even the

pop and soda water concessionaries,

who at first viewed the innovation

with alarm for their sales, are said

to be satisfied that it does not cut in

to their profit seriously.

The Washington club was, however

forced to install the free drinking

water tanks. An act of Congress, passed

last winter, was the cause. Rep.

Howard of Georgia, a thirsty fan,

fathered the bill, which compelled

the club to have water on tap free of

charge. And now the club owners

are said to be considering similar

consideration for fans in other cities.
