HOGS TOUCH HIGH MARK

EXTRA FANCY CATTLE TOO SCORE HIGH

Mutton General Scarce in Portland Stockyards

Portland Stockyards, April 26.—Hogs touched \$8 today in the North Portland yards for some extra good stuff. One load sold at the start of the week at the higher price, which was 15¢ better than the extreme of last week's advance. The quality of load that brought the top was easily worth a nickel more than the general market for extreme quality, therefore the average price for real good stuff is not above \$7.90 @ \$7.95.

While early sale of a load of extra fancy black cattle from Montana was reported at \$7.75 this morning, the cattle trade in general was rather slow about opening. During the day there were arrivals of four loads from Montana, a couple of loads from Utah and quite fair supplies from Idaho points. Total receipts over Sunday were 1226 head compared with 808 head last Monday and 1272 head this same day a year ago.

At Chicago there was a weaker tone generally for cattle with a loss of a dime in the price.

Mutton Just Holding
 While in spots the mutton and lamb situation at North Portland was fractionally weaker today, the general situation showed little change from last week. There was only a fair run reported in the yards over Sunday compared with the nominal showing of last week.

Raisin Day April 30

In accord with the wishes of the people of California, April 30 will be celebrated as Raisin Day and the O. W. R. & N. Co. is giving the matter publicity and preparing to feature raisins on the menu cards of the diners on the day appointed. J. H.
