**UNIFORM SIGN
BOARD PICKED****OREGON TRAIL TO HAVE DIS-
TINCT MARKS**

Club Here Entertains Pendleton Visit-
ors at Dinner

Uniform road signs, made of a blue
field and white letters, reading "Ore-
gon Trail" will dot the historical
highway from the time it leaves Hunt-
ington until it strikes the Columbia
highway from the point it leaves Hunt-
ington to Eastern Oregon will be able to

MOOSE HONOR THEIR DEAD

IMPRESSIVE SERVICE HELD
SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Father P. J. Driscoll and Attorney R.
J. Green Speakers

The Moose Lodge held their memo-
rial services at the lodge room Sun-
day. A musical program was render-
ed by Prof. J. David Haines and or-
chestra. The room was beautifully de-
corated and Angus Steward, dis-
tator, presided.

The memorial day addresses were
rendered by Father Driscoll and At-
torney R. J. Green. Father Driscoll in
his address laid especial stress upon
the fact that the death of the mem-
bers should teach that we know not
when we may be called and that each
should so live as to be ready at any
time for the last call.

Mr. Green paid a tribute to the de-
parted members—8 in number. He
then traced the rise of fraternalism
placing especial stress upon the point
that we are now living in a world
wherein each man is dependent upon
the rest of the world. The day of
individual has passed, and it is neces-
sary for him who would keep abreast
the times to unite and work in har-
mony with his fellows. He then point-
ed out how the order had stood by
the families of bereaved members in
the hour of their need, and that in so
doing it was simply fulfilling its pur-
pose in the complex social life of the
age.

This was the first time that the
order has held a memorial service, but
it is announced that from now on it
will be an annual ceremony. The
ritualistic portions are very appropri-
ate and impressive.

Cotton Crop Looking Up.
Dallas, Tex., Apr. 27.—With Europe
eating up America's cotton in the
form of gun cotton by the thousands
upon thousands of pounds, farmers
through the southwest are planning
this year to plant as much, or more,
cotton than heretofore. While at the
outset of the war, many farmers in-
clined to feel a "never again" spirit,
many are now believing that it was
advisable to continue heavily on the
staple crop. Diversification of crops,
however, manifestly has been boosted
by low cotton prices.

Chicago, Apr. 27.—Dignifying over-
alls. This is the edifying task to
which Principal L. G. Wade of the
Pullman Free School for Manual
Training has dedicated himself and
the school made possible by the will
of the late George M. Pullman. Erect-
ed at a cost of over \$400,000 the school
will open tomorrow.

Surrounded by the gigantic Pull-
man car factories and works, the in-
stitution, an ideal location for an in-
dustrial school. Principal Wade plans
to co-operate with the Pullman com-
pany in its training of apprentices.

The school will be open five and one
half days, 48 weeks in the year, with
a short vacation at the end of the
four quarters. The time of the pu-
pils, who will be in school eight hours
each day, will be divided between the
shops, the laboratories, the athletic
field and the gymnasium.
