BASEBALL GAMES SUNDAY IN DOUBT

Track Meet Prospects Tomorrow Uncertain and Dim

Later—Union Meet is called off.

The likelihood of the county track meet being held tomorrow at Union, or scheduled ball games being played Sunday is extremely dubious this afternoon. If the ball games are played as scheduled, Perry, the team which assumed Union's berth in the State Amateur league, will play the shop team of this city here. The La Grande regulars will go to Union and the Elgin team will play at Baker. Imbler and Cove would play at Imbler, and tomorrow the track meet would be held in Union.

Referring to the track meet tomorrow, Aubrey Smith, superintendent of schools at Union said this morning in a telephone interview that he did not know what would be done, but was extremely anxious to hold it if possible; the prospects were admittedly anything but bright. If not run tomorrow the county meet will not likely be held at all. Physical Director Reynolds had planned to take the team over in automobiles leaving about noon and returning after the meet and had picked the following entries:

Automobilists who have come through Elgin recently report a movement under way there to put the Elgin-Walla Walla road in good condition for cars. It has been suggested that Elgin residents contribute toward rebuilding and repairing the road, and that Union county add a like amount for the work, says an Enterprise paper.

This interests Walla Walla county because there would be a heavy summer automobile travel between Walla Walla basin cities and this section if a more direct road were open. As it is, many travelers come here from the Walla Walla section, although they have to go by the roundabout route through Pendleton and La Grande. From Walla Walla to Elgin across the mountains is about 40 miles; by way of Pendleton it is 147.

In former days there was considerable travel over the hill from Elgin to Walla Walla, but on the Union county side the road has been permitted to fall into disuse and is sadly in need of repair. Two miles or so would have to be completely rebuilt, on new grades. On the Walla Walla side the road is reported in excellent condition, and is much used by summer outing parties.

Walla Walla county is the logical recreation ground for much of the low altitude district in eastern Washington where summers are hot and dusty. But highways must make travel easy, must invite it. The roads in this county are in good condition, and are better each year. Outsiders would be only too glad to get in here to enjoy the beauties of the summer, and will come if the roads permit.

Baker, April 29.—While the number of athletes to be sent to La Grande on May 8 to compete for the Eastern Oregon track championship will be governed by the amount of money which Baker merchants are willing to subscribe for the trip, 12 have been selected by Track Coach Elton who are almost certain to go. In addition there are a number of others who may show enough class before the meet comes off, to warrant their going with the first squad.

Those already chosen are: Wallace Landreth (captain), quarter mile, discus and broad jump; Lynn Gardner, shot put and half mile; Albert Langrell, 50 yard dash and 220 yard low hurdles; Oliver Frances, 50 yard dash, high jump, 220 yard low hurdles and shot put; Owen Keown, high jump, 120 yard high hurdles and pole vault; Ralph Gorman, 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash and discus; Dean Swift, 120 yard high hurdles and high jump; Earl Ward, mile run; Wesley Payton, discus and quarter mile; Albert Harding, 50 yard dash, 100 yard dash and 220 yard dash; William Gardner, javelin and mile run; Asa Williams, javelin.

According to the rules governing the meet, only three from any given school may be entered in one event.
