This was several days ago, and now the congregation has gained assurance that the Baker man will accept. If he does, his resignation at Baker will not take effect until June 1st.

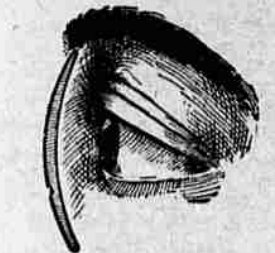

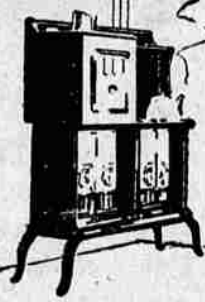
