CONTRACT LET FOR RIM GRAVEL

COMMISSION HURRIES RESERVOIR PROJECT.

Underwriters Oppose Permits for Iron Sheds in Fire Limits.

Bids were received, and one accepted, by the city commission last night, for the providing of gravel with which to build the five-foot rim around the reservoir in South La Grande. Four men bid, and J. D. Fitzgerald got the contract at \$1.315 per cubic yard. M. McMurtry and O. P. Kingsley each offered to do the work for \$2.00, and Bert O'Brien for \$1.50 per yard. Engineer presented his estimate of cost for building the rim that will increase the capacity of the reservoir to 1,600,000 gallons, enough, in a pinch, to do the city for a week if all irrigation was cut off. This estimate points \$1800 as the probable cost.

The commission last evening received a communication from the underwriters' association strongly advising against permission by the commission to building iron sheds in the fire limits, as desired by the Home Independent Telephone company and the Sawyer-Clark Produce company.

Forest Supervisor Ireland informed the commission that a temporary permit had been issued to construct a dam across Beaver creek at the intake. The permanent one must come from the department at Washington.

The commission passed a resolution ordering the street superintendent to notify A. S. Geddes and Turner Oliver that cement walks must be constructed in front of their property on O street.

A resolution was passed giving notice to delinquents in Improvement District No. 54 that they will be given until May 15 to sign up for the bonds and that after that date they will lose that right.

General Manager's report for the week ending May 1st, 1915.

There were no fires last week. The water Superintendent spent \$128.55 including \$32.00 prison labor. A rivet punch cost \$.35 and a man to care for the rubbish at the dump grounds cost \$30.00 during April. He is now employed four hours per day at \$25 cents an hour.

The Police arrested nine. One for the state; two drunks; two disorderly and four trespassers. Served nine meals. Fines \$15.00. Four sleepers. Dogs killed 9, which makes 49 in three weeks. One killed at a stadium, showed indications of rabies.

The recorder received \$15.00 fines; \$50.00 on Sewer 3. Sections No. 2 with \$12.58 interest on same and \$1.20 for broken catch basin covers. On the B. C. P. L. Sinking Fund he drew a warrant for \$2060.00 being par and accrued interest for \$2000 bonds. He drew a contingent warrant for \$20.76 and water warrant for \$5.41 both for April paid out allowed at last meeting. Drew a warrant on the Improvement Bond Sinking Fund for \$1933.03 in payment of bonds 112

He drew a warrant on the Library Fund for \$116.65 for vouchers 271 to 275. Issued dry licenses on treasurer's receipts for \$27.05 and hawker's license \$5.00. The Treasurer received \$175.90 water rent; \$699.58 Imp. Dist. installments; \$276.48 Imp. Dist. interest; \$4.20 interest on Sewer 2, Sec. 3; \$2.45 interest Imp. As there has been some criticism concerning temporary receipts being issued at homes to save water being turned off on penalty and a trip to the city hall to make payment it has been ordered that this be discontinued. This will frequently inconvenience citizens.

The practice is open to abuse and so far the point is well taken. However it will frequently compel folks to make a trip to the city hall, when it is inconvenient to do so.

Citizens will make all payments at the city hall to the proper officials and get proper receipts. Receipts are duplicated by carbon so there can be no question of what has been paid and to whom and for what paid.

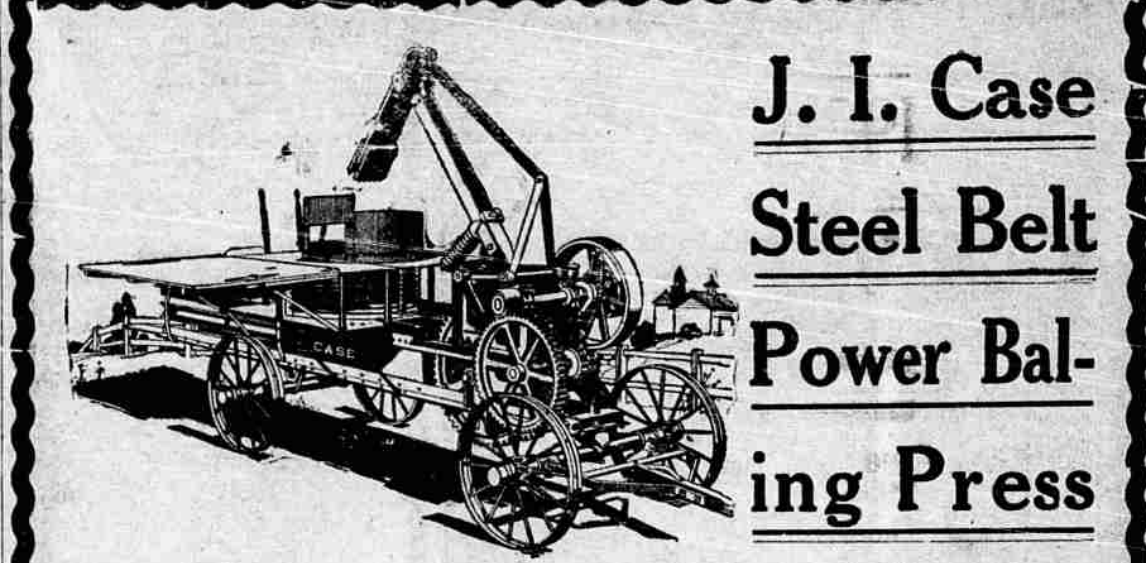
OBSERVATION TOURS VALUABLE

A feature of the county agent work in Nebraska this year has been the agricultural observation tours taken in the respective counties for the purpose of focusing attention to some special method or practice of special value to local agricultural conditions. Silo excursions were held in five of the counties, and they were followed with very excellent results. In western Nebraska and especially in Dawes county, the number of silos has more than doubled following these observation tours. The growing of sweet clover and the value of alfalfa were also made objects of special excursions. As a result a great deal of sweet clover will be put in on sandy soils in Madison county, and the methods of obtaining stands of alfalfa will also be followed out in all parts of that county and in other counties—Government Bulletin.
